

CSAF Logistics Review

Last year I asked our logistics community to perform a top-to-bottom review of all wing-level logistics issues. The purpose of the CSAF Logistics Review (CLR) was simple: to improve our Expeditionary Aerospace Force (EAF) combat readiness. During the Air Force leadership meeting at CORONA Fall, we reviewed the team's progress and agreed to a test program to validate

our findings.

Our operational environment has changed since the end of the Cold War. To meet the challenges of today's global security environment we have revamped our concept of operations to become an EAF. Looking back over the past year we have made tremendous improvement in giving our people a more predictable deployment schedule, adding needed stability to their family lives and career paths. But implementing EAF does not stop there. We must continue to reshape all our processes, logistics included, to better fit our on going and future expeditionary challenges.

During the CLR team review, MAJCOMs identified disconnects in policies, procedures, training, and execution across all functional logistics areas, and developed corrective proposals. The team categorized over 400 issues that affect how we take care of people, our equipment, and our readiness levels. They focus on four basic logistics processes:

Enlisted Technical Training and Officer Development:

Increasing availability of training managers; defining and standardizing wartime tasks; changing Air Force recurring training timing to coincide with Aerospace Expeditionary Forces (AEF) cycles; providing additional maintenance leadership management training for SNCOs and senior officers; improving officer career development, and creating a weapons school for logistics officers.

Materiel Management: Developing metrics to drive pipeline requirements to support AEFs; building standard policy, training, tools, and metrics required to support Regional Supply Squadrons; merging (where appropriate) Supply and Transportation Squadrons; and developing tools / capabilities required to support combat support command and control.

<u>Contingency Planning:</u> Developing contingency planning metrics; establishing policy for deployments and site surveys; building Joint Operations Planning and Execution System certification policies and tracking those so trained; and standardizing logistics plans under Logistics Group Commanders.

Sortie Production / Fleet Management: Providing policy and specific metrics required to drive balance between sortie production and fleet health; establishing senior leaders' metrics guidance and formal training; validating appropriate maintenance tanker organization; and realigning, specifically defining, and renaming the Maintenance Operations Center; as well as possible regionalization of intermediate repair facilities.

We will proceed cautiously with our trial changes in CLR transformation. We will first test the recommendations at selected wings and provide a feedback loop to incorporate your inputs before any Air Force-wide implementation.

Our objectives for the CLR program are:

- Improve Non-Mission Capable for Maintenance (NMCM) rate 10% by 2004
- Improve retention of our critical 5-level logistics and maintenance personnel
- Train our force more professionally across all logistics disciplines
- Stabilize Flying Hour Program execution
- Expand officer logistics technical training for both logisticians and commanders
- Enhance contingency planning, deployment, and execution
- Instill a balanced level of focus for fleet health and sortie production

We need to adjust our logistics processes to better fit the expeditionary challenges we will continually face in the 21st century. We will take the next steps to test implementation at selected wings. With your continued support we can fine tune the successes of our trial CLR initiatives into sound Air Force-wide implementation.

HELP!

Command asking all reservists to aid recruiting effort

With the announcement that the Air Force met its active-duty recruiting goal for this fiscal year, it is more important than ever that Air Force Reserve recruiters get their numbers up as well, but they can't do it without the help of fellow reservists.

The new Get One program, which kicked off Oct. 1, is designed to do just that: get reservists involved in the process of bringing more people into the Reserve.

"We've actually always had this type of program in the Reserve, there just wasn't any command-wide administration, management or communication of it," said Chief Master Sgt. Eric Snipes, superintendent of recruiting's Advertising Branch at Headquarters Air Force Reserve Command, Robins Air Force Base, Ga. "We want reservists to think of themselves as honorary recruiters." The Reserve is beefing up the Get One program because data show reservist referrals, more than any other type of leads, result in the most enlistments.

"With fewer people leaving active duty, recruiters must concentrate on bringing more people into the Reserve from other sources," Snipes said. "And that is what the Get One program is designed to do."

Get One is simple to use. All reservists have to do is fill out a response card (included in this magazine). The card includes space for a potential recruit's name, address and telephone number, as well as the reservist's own information, for recognition purposes. The card is postage paid and pre-addressed, so once it's filled out, all a reservist has to do is drop it in a mailbox. No stamp is required. In addition to being provided in this and future issues, cards will be available through local Reserve recruiters.

If a reservist doesn't want to use regular mail, information about a potential

recruit may be entered onto an electronic form similar to the card. This form is available on recruiting's Web site

www.afreserve.com/getone

There is also a toll-free number available for reservists to provide referrals:

"Our goal is to make the program as user friendly as possible," Snipes said. The redesigned program includes new incentives for reservists whose referrals result in someone entering the Reserve. "Every member who sends in the name of a potential recruit under the Get One program will receive a token of appreciation," Snipes said. "Subsequently, if the referral enlists, there will be even more rewards and recognition. For the top 'recruiter' in each wing, there will be special awards and recognition from the wing commander."

The Get One program is modeled after successful employee referral programs in the civilian sector.

"Member referrals are great leads because reservists affiliate with people like themselves," Snipes said, "so they know who would and wouldn't make a good member."

"When AFRC gets new recruits, units get more manning, thus there are more people to help do the job," Snipes said. Reserve recruiting will be spreading news about the program through a direct mailing to every reservist's home. In addition, periodic reminders will be placed on reservists' leave and earnings statements; in IMA Update, a publication produced by the Air Reserve Personnel Center in Denver; and Citizen Airman magazine. And finally, recruiters will be visiting organizations during unit training assemblies to pass out brochures and post flyers to remind reservists to "Get One."

Air Force Green

Is the Air Force turning green? The answer is 'yes' if you listen to Colonel Patrick T. Fink, Chief of the Environmental Division at Headquarters Air Education and Training Command, Randolph AFB, Texas.

Fink was at Vance AFB, Enid, Okla., to explain the implications of Executive Order 13148—Greening the Government Through Leadership in Environmental Management.

Fink's presentation highlighted the successes and challenges federal agencies encounter when balancing mission and environmental concerns. He also recognized Vance AFB's efforts in pollution prevention and congratulated the base upon receiving the 1999 U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Environmental Excellence Award. Vance AFB also received the 1999 General Thomas D. White Pollution Prevention Award for a non-industrial installation by Headquarters Air Education and Training Command.

One of the individuals behind both the award and presentation was Jennifer Kilbourn, a civilian employee at Vance AFB and a traditional reservist as an engineer with the 507th Civil Engineer Squadron (CES). In her civilian capacity as an environmental engineer, she is responsible for quality assurance evaluation of all the environmental and energy programs at Vance AFB. She is responsible for review and coordination of more than 20 different environmental plans, covering a variety of areas such as hazardous materials, hazardous waste, and pollution prevention. Kilbourn's environmental concerns also transfer into her work for the Air Force Reserve. Kilbourn spent a portion of her annual tour supporting the United States Air Force Civil Engineer, Environmental Directorate in the coordination and execution of the 1999 Air Force Department of Defense Environmental Awards ceremonies.

Tips for Volk Field

The Ability to Survive and Operate (ATSO)

Contamination avoidance

- -- Place everything possible, especially critial resources, inside a facility, structure, or under cover prior to an attack so it won't get contaminated.
- -- For those items that must be left outside, use pallet covers, tarps, cardboard, garbage bags, ponchos, or anything you can imagine to cover them.
- -- Place radios, notebooks, checklists, tools, *etc.* in plastic bags. Close aircraft canopies, doors, and cover intakes; close vehicle doors and windows; close building doors, windows, and seal any holes.

Trans-Attack

- -- Shut down non-chemical biological filtered ventilation systems. Fill and seal water containers for later use, and place then inside or under cover.
- -- Take extra cover. In addition to your chem gear, take cover under a structure, roof, trees, or under your poncho. During missile attacks, stay covered for the first hour when outside.
- -- Take the best available cover in the immediate area.
- -- Don all remaining required individual protection equipment.
- -- Seek protection from blast, projectiles, shrapnel, heat, and contamination, as directed by the threat.
- -- Close ventilation to the outside. Shut doors / windows, close canopies, and cover intakes.

Post-Attack

- -- Avoid obviously contaminated items and areas.
- -- Look out for supicious puddles, dust or clouds.
- -- Check detector paper / tape for color change.
- -- Mark off and report suspected contamination, dead animals, holes, and UXO entry sites.
- -- Watch where you step and sit. Do not kneel on the ground. Although you have protective gear on, you need to reduce the amount of contamination soaking in.

Be Alert

-- Mark and report contamination to warn others!

FREE COLLEGE TESTING

Air Force Reserve members, spouses and civilian employees may take DANTES Subject StandardizedTests (DSSTs) or College-Level Examinations Program (CLEP) or Regents College Examinations (RCE) tests FREE! These examinations test college-level knowledge you may have gained through your job, reading, travel, or hobbies. You must test at your Reserve DANTES approved test center. Testing at another DANTES test center will be on a case-by-case basis. The third Tuesday of each month at 0800 has been set aside for testing. You must call us four weeks prior to test date to ensure we will have your test by test date. Some tests are stocked while others must be ordered. For more information contact CMSgt. Epps in the MPF Education & Training Office at 734-7075. The 2000 Edition CLEP and DANTES Study Guides are in our office.

PROFESSIONAL CERTIFICATION

Become a certified professional in a field related to your military training. DANTES and AFRC funded certification examinations are available for certain career fields. Go to http://www.voled.doded.mil/dantes/cert/index.htm and click on AFR Matrix which identifies the eligible AFSCs, certification exams available and internet addresses for more info. If you desire to take an exam, contact CMSgt. Epps in the MPF Education & Training Office at 734-7075.

TUITIONASSISTANCE

Reserve members are eligible to apply for Tuition Assistance (TA) for Distance Learning and In-Residence courses to further their education up to a Bachelor's Degree.

The basic enrollment requirements are that, you must:

- Pay for the course up-front and after satisfactory completion, be reimbursed 75% (tuition only) per course, not to exceed \$2500 per FY.
 - Be a participating member in good standing (no UIF, Article 15, etc.).
 - Complete enrollment forms in our office.

Enrollment in new dental program starts in December

WASHINGTON – Starting Feb. 1, 2001, traditional reservists and their families may participate in an expanded U.S. government dental program if the reservists express an intent to remain in the reserve for at least 12 consecutive months.

Enrollment in the new TRICARE Dental Program is voluntary and begins in December 2000, with coverage effective Feb. 1, 2001. Service members enrolled in the TRICARE Selected Reserve Dental Program or the TRICARE Family Member Dental Plan will be automatically enrolled in the new program.

To enroll, service members must have at least a one-year service commitment in the active force, reserve forces or a combination of the two. Under the new plan, all eligible family members of a sponsor will be enrolled if one of them is enrolled. Children under the age of 4 will not have to be enrolled. Also, the sponsor can only enroll family members from one location if family members reside in two or more geographically separated locations.

Reservists are currently eligible for the TRICARE Selected Reserve Dental Program, which offers limited dental care for Selected Reserve reservists only.

Members of a reservist's family are not eligible for the TRICARE Family Member Dental Plan unless the reservist is on extended active duty for at least 24 months.

The Department of Defense awarded a five-year, \$1.8 billion contract April 14 to United Concordia Companies, Inc., the current TRICARE Family Member Dental Plan administrator.

"With this new TRICARE Dental Program contract, we have addressed some important concerns of our beneficiaries," said Dr. Sue Bailey, who was assistant secretary of defense for health affairs when the contract was awarded. "We will now offer a more uniform benefit across beneficiary categories and include our reserve component families. The new contract offers expanded and improved benefits, and it solves some problems associated with the TRICARE Selected Reserve Dental Program. We believe our beneficiaries will be pleased with this new dental plan."

In the Air Force, the Selected Reserve includes about 60,000 reservists in the Air Force Reserve Command unit program and more than 12,000 individual mobilization augmentees.

The 507th ARW finished the first phase of its Pacer CRAG Aircraft Modification Program, as well as continued training and support of national defense objectives.


The fledgling 513th ACG, activated Mar. 15, 1996, remained busy with defense support missions and

The 507th Air Refueling Wing


Ten aircraft and 16 crews were deployed to Istres AB, France, in support of Operations Deliberate Guard and Joint Force. The 1st Aviation Standards Flight, activated 2 October 1998, under the 507th Operations Group, continued to test and certify airport instrument approaches throughout the world. The 507th ARW wrapped up 1999 when aircraft, aircrew, and maintenance personnel returned at the end of December from Istres AB, France, supporting Operation Deliberate Guard.

The unit's aircraft supported a major exercise at Moron AB, Spain, in February. Also unit aircraft supported Air War College students and faculty with a Northwest Asia tour from

that same month through March.

After the Air Force announced the temporary stand down of a sizable percentage of the KC-135 fleet, the unit responded to a "911 call" from Air Mobility Command (AMC), deploying its unaffected aircraft again to Istres AB in support of Operation Deliberate Guard in February through March. 507th ARW aircraft supported a major Navy exercise while deployed to MacDill AFB, Fla. In March The unit supported another Navy "Business Effort" exercise at Roosevelt Roads Naval Station, Puerto Rico, in May. All of these missions were accomplished with only

eight operational aircraft. At any given time, one of our primary aircraft was in Programmed Depot Maintenance, while another spent at least two months off station undergoing Pacer CRAG modifications. We completed aircraft modifications on a new inter-phone panel, air refueling pumps, and overcame challenges with the KC-135 fleet stabilizer trim actuator problems. 507th ARW maintenance crews completed the air refueling transfer pump Time Compliance Technical Order in less than half the allotted time. The wing continued maintaining a tanker aircraft and a mission crew on 24-hour alert status supporting US Strategic Command's Single Integrated Operations Plan requirements. In April, 507th Medical Squadron (Med. Sq.) members deployed in support of Air Expeditionary Force taskings. During May, the 507th Med. Sq. also became a lead unit in providing support to Headquarters Air Force Reserve Command's tasking for anthrax edu-







cational briefings. Lt. Col. David Vu, flight surgeon for the 507th Med. Sq., traveled across the country providing this education at Air Force Reserve Command units. ary through March; Sentry Leap, Tinker AFB, Okla., in February; and Weapons and Tactics Instruction, MCAS Yuma, Ariz., March through April. Members of the group participated in Maple Flag at Canadian Forces Base Cold Lake, Canada, in May and were the first all-Reserve USAFAWACS participation in this joint-service, multinational large force exercise. The Maple Flag scenario provided a realistic simulation of current theatre operations in a United Nations resolution enforcement operation requiring combined and joint offensive strike operations (including aerial refueling) against a realistic threat.




"What is your favorite tradition you observe during


