

Officials Impressed With 507th

High-ranking military officials touring facilities of Detachment 507, 301st Tactical Fighter Wing, have all left with one thing in common -- they are visibly impressed with the abilities and capabilities of the unit members, detachment commander Maj. Roger P. Scheer says.

"The way we have successfully converted to the fighter, the way we passed our Operational Readiness Test and have continued to improve has definitely impressed everyone who has been here,

Gen. Robert J. Dixon, the new commander of the Tactical Air Command, was one of the last high ranking dignitaries to visit the Tinker AFB unit. The general made his visit on an initial fact-finding tour of TAC units, with the 507th the first Reserve unit on the list.

Although the General's visit lasted only an hour and a half, he seemed favorably impressed with the appearance and operation of the Unit. After the "in-briefing", an open discussion period

and short tour of 507th facilities followed.

Dr. Theodore C. Marrs deputy assistant secretary of Defense for reserve affairs, was another high level visitor who came away with a good feeling toward the 507th.

Re-Up Now, Scheer Urges

Under a program recently initiated by the Pentagon, first-term airmen who are within a year of discharge will be asked to reenlist immediately, Major Roger P Scheer told the NCO/Airman Advisory Board.

The Detachment Commander explained that the personnel center in Denver, Colo., will send a computer print-out each month which lists the men who are within a year of discharge, mainly to help unit commanders and first sergeants plan their needs for the upcoming vear.

"It's important that these men understand what this print-out means and

Committee To Inspect Hair Length

Airmen may soon be advising sergeants to get a hair cut, if an enlisted group's recommendation is followed.

The NCO/Airman Advisory Board recommended last UTA that each unit of the detachment form a committee to check hair cuts during sign in on Saturday of the UTA's.

Sgt. Russell D. Wiley of the Civil Engineer Flight noted that his unit has a five-man committee which checked haircuts and "there were no problems at all."

"When a member of the committee told a man he needed a haircut, the man went to the barber shop before noon," Wiley told the council.

He noted that the committee ranges from airman to tech sergeant and when "we tell somebody he needs a haircut, he knows it's not just some lifer talking."

Wiley said that in his unit, a man who did not get his haircut by noon, when told of his hair length by a committee member, was redlined by the first sergeant.

"We keep records, and if it's a recurring thing (the same man being told about his hair length each UTA), it will be brought to the attention of the first sergeant. The commander has assured the committee that appropriate steps will then be taken," Wiley said.

"Basically, it's so the Air Force Reserve can plan a year ahead, plan their needs and appropriations according to the men on board and the number of men who plan to reenlist.

"We must explain to the man the reason behind this policy. Only in this way will he know the real importance that higher Headquarters attaches to every member of the Reserve", the Major said.

However, he explained if a man is to be discharged, the personnel center wants as much time as possible to fill his slot with another airman.

"If the airman says
we doesn't want to reenlist
the personnel center will
start programming someone
else into that slot.

"Then, if he changes his mind and wants to remain in the same slot, it may no longer be available to him", the Major said.

"This program is not meant to antagonize anyone by forcing he or she into an early decision. The significance of the Total Force Policy makes it mandatory that future manning levels can be accurately predicted. All Commanders and supervisors have been instructed to brief their personnel on the details of this program. Please contact your supervisor if you have any questions before making a decision", the Major added.
