# NEW GI BILL FOR EDUCATION

The new GI Bill is a major milestone in support by Congress for the reserve forces. The new program of college benefits takes effect July 1, and all current members of the selected reserve and those entering the reserve through June 30, 1988, are eligible.

To qualify, a reservist must have a high school diploma or equivalent, but not a college degree. He must take the Armed Forces Qualification Test, complete initial active duty training and have been a member of the selected reserve for at least 180 days, with a record of satisfactory participation.

The reservist must be able to enlist, extend or immediately re-enlist on or after July 1, for a period which, when added to the member's current obligated service, equals or exceeds six years of reserve service from July 1.

Members who use the new GI Bill, may also receive enlistment and re-enlistment bonuses.

Commissioned officers must agree to serve for a period of not less than six years in addition to any other obligated service as of July 1.


# CORROSION SHOP GOES TO GRAVEYARD

# **ACTION LINE**

# (IN RESPONSE TO YOUR QUESTIONS)

QUES: I co-signed a loan for a friend, who left the state without paying. Now the bank wants me to pay the entire balance, without trying to collect first from my "former" buddy. Can they do that?

ANS: Yes, the lender can choose who to go after, either of you. The lender does not have to go after the primary borrower first. According to the law, the primary borrower and the co-signer are equally liable.

QUES: Is it permissible to wear combat boots with the blue uniform?

ANS: Yes, if you have the right type boot. AFR 35-10 allows wearing combat boots with the fatigue uniform, the blue service uniform and the functional uniform. However, if the boots have safety toes, they cannot be worn with the blue service uniform.

# GOOD, BAD AND UGLY 507TH HAS ALL THREE, SAYS RECENT POLL

In a January UTA survey, 341 members of the 507th shared personal thoughts on how to make their unit better.

Some thought there was unequal treatment in travel, training and promotions. There were complaints about training quality and lack of planning for UTAs. Some felt they were outsiders, and accused ARTs of favoritism, not making sure all the information filtered down on weekends.

Career advisors were chided for not being visible and available. Fewer than 30 percent of the people surveyed knew much about the unit retention program.

Some members admitted they might have joined the 507th for patriotism and job challenge, but those feelings had deteriorated into just money and retirement.

The vast majority, however, listed travel, patriotism, the good people and job challenge in addition to just money.

Most reservists (80 percent) said their job was what they had expected. And 87 percent said they had been briefed on benefits, military conduct, proper wear of the uniform, working procedures and unit requirements. Over 88 percent felt they had a part in the mission.

When asked how to improve the 507th, the most frequent replies were more travel, better training, better planning, more promotions and money, more recognition, rewards and respect, better equipment and facilities, and improved communications.

To summarize, the general feeling was that "reservists enjoy serving their country while preserving their civilian lifestyle," said MSgt Betty Pottier, group career advisor. "The answers gave us new insight into our retention problems, and we'll pay close attention to career irritants that surfaced."



# ROGERS AIDS HEART ATTACK VICTIM
