Reservist is awarded for protecting C-5

Westover AFB, Mass. - Two reservists, one a member of the 507th Tactical Fighter Group's Weapons System Security Flight, were awarded the Air Force Achievement Medal on Nov. 5 for their quick action during a dangerous situation two days earlier on the flightline here.

SrA. David Mainord from the 507th TFG, on temporary duty with the 639th WSSF at Westover AFB, was on his first night of duty as an entry controller to the C-5 parking area when a light cart caught on fire near a C-5A Galaxy

"There was a carbon build-up in the light cart's exhaust system," Airman Mainord explained. "It caught on fire and started spewing red-hot sparks all over the place."

SSgt. Phillip Smith, a reservist also on temporary duty from March AFB, Calif., had just reached the scene with a cup of coffee for Airman Mainord, who would have normally been alone. Sergeant Smith attempted to turn the light cart off, but the sparks continued spewing out, Airman Mainord said.

"I radioed an alarm for the fire department," Airman Mainord said. "Then Sergeant Smith and I hooked the cart up to a truck and pulled it away to

Sergeant Smith said, "It was one of those things that when you think about it later, you say, 'Wow, why didn't I just run?

Capt. Robert Mooney, commander of the 639th WSSF at Westover AFB, said the quick action and coolheadedness saved the other workers in the area from possible injury and the surrounding equipment from potentially serious damage.

The Air Force Achievement Awards were presented by Brig. Gen. Frederick Walker, 439th MAW commander.

In the citation, Airman Mainord was recognized for his "outstanding service

Col. William Brandt, IG team chief, also congratulated the unit.

"I've been in the IG business off and on for seven years and contrary to what most people think, it's not always a lot of fun. A lot of times you have to go into somebody's house and tell them their baby's ugly," he said.

"Well, I think you can see from this report that you've got a great looking kid and something to be proud of. I was impressed and my team was impressed with what we saw here. We recognized that your job has been doubly tough because you've been faced with maintaining the F-4 while also trying to get ready for your new aircraft, the F-16. Our hats are off to you for those efforts. You've set a margin for other units to try to beat," he said.

In addressing the audience, Colonel Turner said, "This (rating) is a heck of an accolade for the 507th Tactical Fighter Group. This is a group rating and it's shared by all. My only regret is that you couldn't see all 1,457 of my 'good-looking kids' this morning.

Six top performers are promoted through P

The 507th Tactical Fighter Group received six new promotees October 1 by way of the Professional Enhancement Program (PEP). Three unit members received master sergeant stripes while three others received technical sergeants stripes.

Master sergeant stripes were awarded to Gayle Lopes and Terry Thrower from Combat Support Squadron (CSS), along with Ron Abersoll from the Consolidated Aircraft Mainte-

nance Squadron (CAMS). Technical sergeant stripes were awarded to Michael Kessler and Alan Ward from CAMS and Danny Cross from CSS.

PEP stripes are awarded to qualified Air Force Reserve members who are top performers of the organization but are hindered by promotions because of the slot they are holding. For example, if someone were in a position that only authorizes a technical sergeant, that would be the highest rank attainable no

matter how long they have been in the unit or how well they perform their job. PEP allows individuals to exceed the grade authorization by one stripe.

According to 2nd Lt. John Giamello, Chief of Personnel, "This is a highly competitive promotion system and only the best are considered. Those selected at group level then compete for the stripes against other selectees in the

PEP selections are made twice a year with promotions mid-cycle in March and October.

Commissioning program changes

Improvements in the Deserving Airman Commissioning Program make it easier for enlisted reservists to become officers, according to Air Force Reserve officials.

These changes include eliminating a time limit for applications and a quota. If a vacancy exists in a unit, reservists can submit applications, said Roy Cross of the AFRES personnel actions division here.

Also, the AFRES vice commander now has the authority to convene a selection board at any time during the year. Previously, the selection board met once a year at the Air Force Reserve Personnel Center in Denver.

Reservists must still hold a bache lor's degree, have unit commander approval, be appointed as a commissioned officer before age 30 and meet medical, educational, testing and other requirements to qualify for nomination to the board.

The changes took effect in August with the recent publishing of the new Air Force Regulation 36-15.

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"News Hound" ruling issued

Cable News Network has been actively advertising a news-gathering program called "News Hound." This program will consider airing home videotape recordings of potentially newsworthy events taken by amateurs.

If the material is used, the photographer can be compensated for the story, making this program very tempting to many home video buffs.

In view of this, each Air Force member needs to be aware of the ground rules for releasing official Air Force, information. According to a recent message from the Secretary of the Air Force Public Affairs Office, any material shot off base while off duty is personal and the photographer can do what he or she pleases with the video. However, if the material is shot on base or while on duty, release of the material outside the Air Force is

contrary to Air Force directives. This guidance applies to unauthorized release of any information.

Air Force Regulation 190-1, "Public Affairs Policies and Procedures," clearly states the procedures for releasing information, and who may make a release. The regulation states, "the command is responsible for releasing information to the public. Even though information is unclassified or has been cleared by security review . . . it cannot be given to the public unless the commander approves it for that purpose."

Each person is responsible for getting the necessary review and clearance through their respective Public Affairs Office before releasing any proposed written or spoken statement, or taking any action that involves an issue of public concern. (TACNS)

New personnel system ready

Air Force Reserve members can expect to see personnel actions completed quicker and more accurately through a new system called Personnel Concept III (PC-III), according to

personnel officials here.

"PC-III is a program being undertaken by the Air Force to improve the quality and efficiency of personnel service at locations throughout the world, using improved information processing technologies," said MSgt. Janet Whatley of the AFRES personnel systems division.

According to 2nd Lt. John Giamello, chief, 507th TFG CBPO, the current personnel system, while automated, requires large numbers of paper forms and rosters to be transferred between personnel offices and operational units to input or retrieve information.

"Delays in information processing, inaccuracies and loss of paperwork that often result will be reduced or eliminated through PC-III," he said.

The new system will feature "gateway" computer systems in supporting active-duty consolidated base personnel offices and end-point computer systems in AFRES military and some civilian personnel offices. These will all be connected through electronic communications. In addition, PC-III equipment will link CBPOs and supporting unit orderly rooms in AFRES units.

"PC-III will help people in CBPOs and orderly rooms efficiently perform routine personnel work, such as reporting the change of a supervisor, approving a promotion list or applying for retraining," the lieutenant said.

"Although the system will automate what's now being done manually, the certification/approval paperwork for commanders and supervisors won't be eliminated by PC-III," Sergeant Whatley said. "We believe worksheets will be used by the units to meet these requirements."

The Air Force began a two-year test of the system in July 1986. AFRES participation in the test will begin in February 1988 at Dobbins AFB, Ga., and Robins AFB.

The Air Force will decide in May 1988 whether to implement the system Air Force-wide," Sergeant Whatley said. "If worldwide implementation is favorable, the Air Force will start a four-year implementation schedule for active-duty bases and their supported off-base locations in late 1988. Eventually all AFRES military and civilian personnel offices and units will participate in PC-III." (AFRNS)

First F-16C/D unit activates

Luke AFB, Az. — Members of the 944th Tactical Fighter Group marked the activation of the first AFRES fighter unit to be equipped with brand new F-16C/D Fighting Falcons on Oct. 24.

The 944th is a "sister" unit to the 507th under the 419th Tactical Fighter

KC-10 units gear up

Bergstrom AFB, Texas — Recruiting and training are the initial primary concerns for three KC-10 associate maintenance squadrons activated by the Air Force Reserve October 1.

The new units are at Seymour Johnson AFB, N.C., Barksdale AFB, La., and March AFB, Calif. Reservists currently provide 50 percent of the aircrews for the KC-10 tanker/cargo aircraft. The activation of the squadrons is the first time they are being

tasked to provide maintenance support for the KC-10, officials said.
