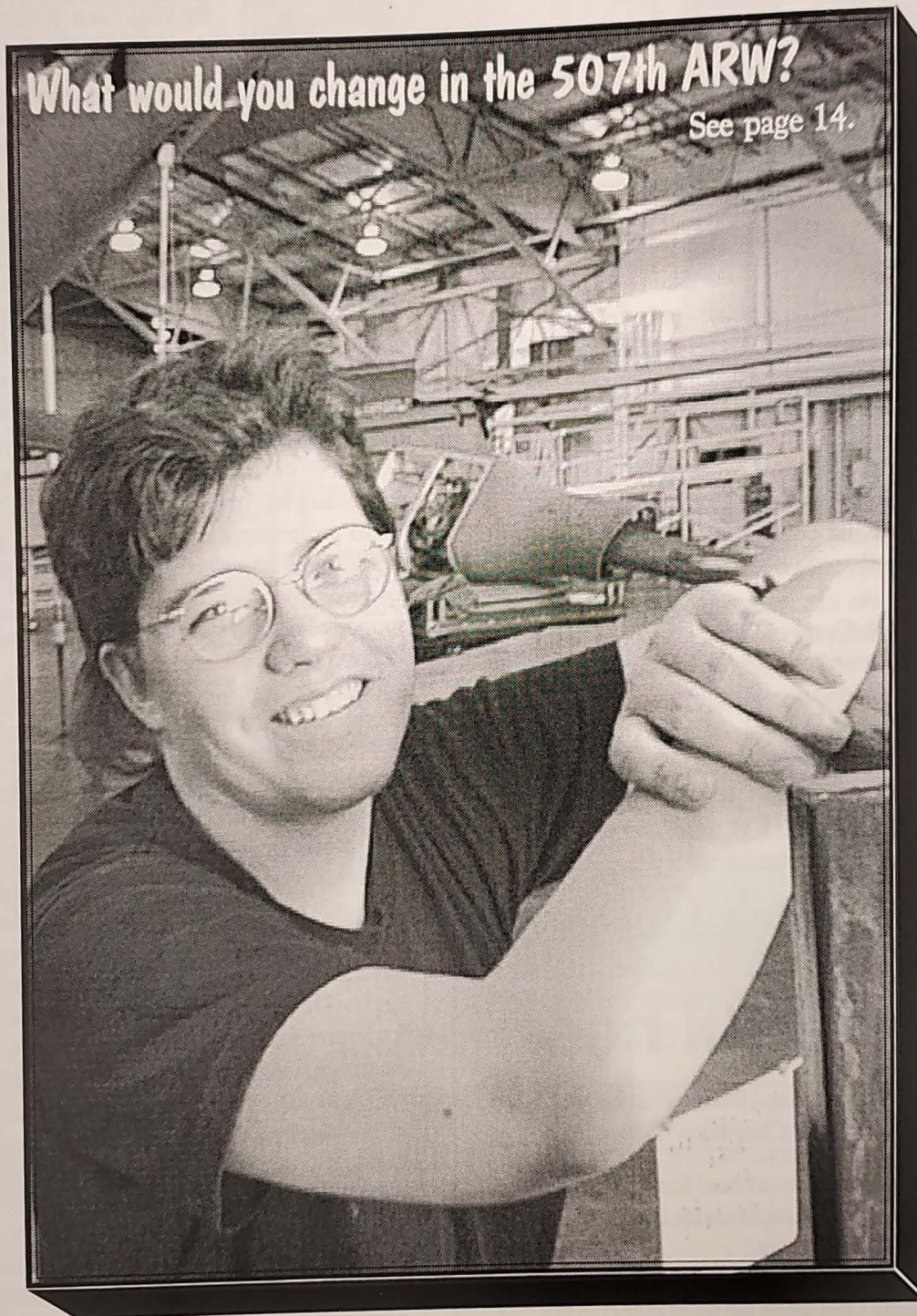

Beavin assumes command of the 507th Logistics Group

Lt. Col. David J. Beavin began a new era in his military career May 2 as he assumed command of the 507th Logistics Group. Present for the assumption of command were his parents; Leo J. and Genevieve "Jeff" Beavins; sister, Barbara Pinto with her husband, Phillip Pinto, and their children, John and Scott Pinto. Beavin has served in many capacities relating to the military, from active duty Air Force, Civil Air Patrol, Air National Guard, and now, the Air Force Reserve.

Beavin began his military career in the Air Force Officers' Training School (OTS) at Lackland AFB, Texas in 1973. After graduation from the Aircraft Maintenance Officers' Course, his first assignment was with the 436th Field Maintenance Squadron at Dover AFB, Del., in mid-1974. He entered undergraduate pilot training at Craig AFB, Alabama, in April 1976. Recognizing that flying was not for him, he left the Air Force for civilian life in September 1976.

In January 1981, Beavin became a liaison officer with the Civil Air Patrol in Louisville, Kentucky. Six months later, he joined the Kentucky Air National Guard as an aircraft maintenance officer. His civilian job moved him to Arizona, and in 1985 he joined the Professional Military Education staff as a faculty advisor, and in January 1986, was appointed to the position of senior training officer of military training.

Nine months later, he accepted the position of Assistant Deputy Commander for Maintenance Production (as a full-time Air Reserve Technician) with the 512th Military Airlift Wing (Associate), Dover AFB, Del. He assumed command of the 512th Logistics Support Flight on Aug. 1, 1992. On April 19, 1997, he accepted the position as Chief of Wing Plans and Programs.

Beavin's military awards include the Meritorious Service Medal with one oak leaf cluster, the Air Force Commendation Medal, the National Defense Service Medal with one oak leaf cluster, the Air Force Longevity Service Award Ribbon with three oak leaf clusters, and the Armed Forces Reserve Medal with one oak leaf cluster among others.

He is a member of the Air Force Association, the Reserve Officer Association, the Maintenance Officer Association and the Airlift Tanker Association.

Beavin is married to the former Angela M. Patterson of Seattle, Wash. She is currently a captain in the Air Force Reserve serving as executive officer for the 512th Operations Group, Dover AFB, Del.

They have three daughters; Jennifer, 19; Brianna, 5; and Danielle, 3.

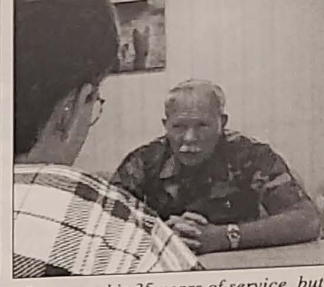
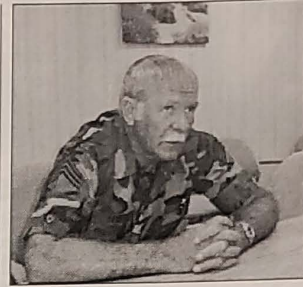
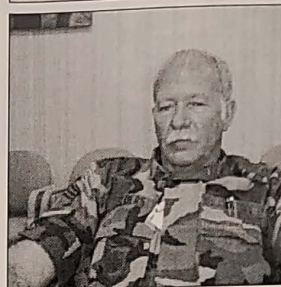

BLUE WATERS on the horizon

CMSgt. Jerry G. Elders, Noncommissioned Officer in Charge (NCOIC) of the Aircraft Generation Squadron, has seen many places and contributed much to his country since joining the Air Force.

On the eve of his retirement, after 35 years of service, Elders has a positive outlook for his future including plans for the kind of traveling most people only dream about.

Elders' career started with advice from a family member in 1963.

"I had a brother-in-law that was in the Air Force who kind of talked me into it," Elders said. "He brought me up to Hamilton AFB before they closed it. I went up there to see him on weekends and he would give me good reasons on why I should join the Air Force."

Taking his brother-in-law's advice, Elders reported to Perrin AFB, Texas, after basic training and technical school. He applied his new skills to the T-33 "T-bird" jet aircraft as an aircraft mechanic.

"I stayed at Perrin for about three years," he said. "Then I was assigned to an F-4 Field Training Detachment School at MacDill AFB [near Tampa, Fla.], which was a six-week school. From there, I went straight to Tan Son Nhut, Vietnam. I was in country from September 1967 to September 1968."

When Elders' Southeast Asia tour was finished, he was assigned to Mountain Home AFB, Idaho, where he worked on RF-4C Reconnaissance aircraft. Around 1969, he was assigned to Holloman AFB, N.M.

"About 1970, they mobilized the whole wing and sent us to Thailand," Elders said. "I stayed in Thailand 189 days and came back to Holloman. One thing I remember is they had already closed Takhli [Royal Thai AB,] Thailand down. It was closed for about a year when we came rolling in. The Thais had taken all the wiring and everything out, so there wasn't any power when we got there," he said.

After his tour in Thailand, Elders was reassigned to Holloman AFB. It was not long afterwards that he received another set of orders for an overseas tour. This time the orders read "Korea." The orders also came at a time when Elders was up for reenlistment. After much deliberating, he decided not to reenlist and he returned to civilian life.

"When I got out in 1974," he said, "I didn't care if I'd ever see another airplane again in my life. I got out under the Transition Program where they find you a civilian job with someone who is willing to train you in a new field. I went to work for a place in Alamogordo, N.M., fixing TVs. I worked there for about six months," he said.

During the six months, Elders thought back on his military years and felt there were associations with it that he didn't have anymore. Taking a friend's advice, he put in an application with the Air Force Reserve's Air Reserve Technician (ART) program.

"I didn't know what an ART was then," he said. "I wrote my application and sent it to Texas and thought I would give it a try."

It wasn't long after submitting his application that he was called by SMSgt. Jimmy Akins, phase dock supervisor for

Interservice training

What do you get when you bring together an aerial port unit, a C-5 "Galaxy" and its crew, a group of Navy personnel and their equipment to be loaded on the airplane, and they're all Reservists?

You get a snapshot of current and future air mobility operations, and that's exactly what happened on base during the April Unit Training Assembly.

The 72nd Aerial Port Squadron (APS) teamed-up with a C-5 crew from the 301st Airlift Squadron (AS) out of Travis AFB, Calif., and the 113th Mobile In-Shore Undersea Warfare Unit, a local Navy Reserve unit, for a weekend of valuable aircraft load training. The event, which was initiated by the 72nd, is a prime example of how units from different bases and branches of the military can, and need, to come together to hone their air mobility skills.

That fact was not lost on the participants in the exercise, as everyone pitched in to train in a not unlikely scenario.

The 72nd APS gained further training on aircraft load operations. The 301st AS got some up-grade training for their new loadmasters, and the Navy folks learned some things about "getting out-of-town" on an Air Force aircraft. This was a good deal!

And it's not a one-time good deal, as the 72nd APS is becoming more active in seeking-out untapped opportunities for interunit and interservice training, all under the leadership of the squadron commander, Maj. Guy Lindholm. "Since the 72nd APS is located at an inactive air terminal, we have to be resourceful in finding ways to keep ourselves proficient in port operations. If we look around, there are all sorts of units with an air mobility tasking. All we need to do is talk to these folks and let them know we want to work with them," Lindholm said.

the 507th Tactical Fighter Group (TFG), and asked if he wanted to be considered for an aircraft maintenance job. "It was only about 25 cents more an hour than I was making fixing TVs and I told him I would think about it," he said. "I got to thinking about the 11 years of military service I had that I could apply toward this job and retirement. So when called back, I just told him 'Yeah, I'll take the job.'"

Elders started his ART career at the 507th TFG Jan. 13, 1975, when the group had F-105 "Thunderchief" aircraft. Since 1975, Elders has worked in phase dock, avionics, flightline, and the quality office. Elders first supervisory position came while working on the flightline. During the past 23, years he has occupied several supervisory positions in the unit.

Elders made Chief Master Sergeant in 1985. "I always wanted to make chief," he said. "When I made chief, it was a pretty significant moment in my life."

During the period when the 507th ARW was without a maintenance squadron commander, Elders took this leadership role as Senior enlisted ART for the Logistics Group. With his pending retirement, Elders has plans to work a little longer in the civilian sector here and then take it easy for awhile.

I haven't got to do too much of that yet. I've been down there two or three times and we really like it."

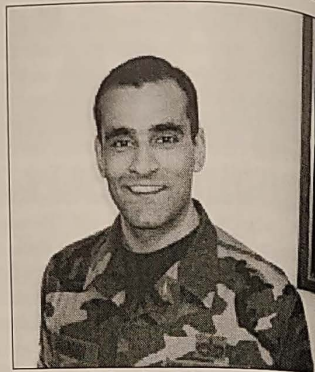

First Sergeants

MSgt. Carvel D. Davis and TSgt. Jay Jahangiri are the 507th Air Refueling Wing's (ARW) newest first sergeants.

The selection was made last month for Davis to serve the 513th Aircraft Generation Squadron and Jahangiri to serve the 507th Logistics Support Squadron.

The selection board consisted of top ranking unit enlisted members and respective squadron commanders.

MSgt. Carvel Davis has been a member of the 507th ARW since 1983, according to MSgt. Martha Smith, NCO in Charge of the Nondestructive Inspection (NDI) Lab at the 507th Maintenance Squadron. He began his tenure with the 507th ARW as an air reserve technician (ART) in charge of the NDI Lab.

"In this capacity, he was met with the immediate challenge of converting an NDI lab that had been neglected and without supervision, to full operational status. In a matter of months, the NDI lab was converted from a virtual storeroom for damaged office furniture and equipment, to one whose quality level is comparable to or exceeds that of any active duty or commercial lab," said Smith.

Davis held his ART position for 10 years before excepting his current assignment as supervisor of the Oklahoma City-Air Logistics Center's NDI Lab, Tinker AFB.

TSgt. Jay Jahangiri is a highly articulate and self-motivated individual who has demonstrated capabilities in the area of office management and maintenance of section training records, according to MSgt. Kenneth Mars, NCO in Charge of Vehicle Maintenance. He also developed a computer software program to track all training courses for the section.

"As a supervisor, Technical Sergeant Jahangiri has developed a cooperative relationship with his subordinates who not only look up to him with respect, but also come to him for advice and direction," Mars added.

"All the applicants credentials," said CMSgt. Robert Kellington, 507th ARW Senior Enlisted Advisor, "were impeccable and made the process extremely difficult. It shows the caliber of individuals assigned to the wing who are ready to accept responsibility and new challenges."

Disaster Preparedness

Units may schedule Chemical Warfare Training, by-name, throughout the year by calling the DW office at x45249, NLT one UTA prior to requested class date. Ensure all personnel bring their "go-bag," including gas mask and chemical warfare ensemble to all classes. It is imperative that classes start on time. Anyone arriving late will be reported as a no-show.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Bring gas mask eyeglass inserts if you have them. In addition, please be aware that contact lenses can not be worn during this training.

Just an Educational Reminder

You probably already know you can take CLEP and DANTES credit-by-examination tests at no charge. In fact, as one of your reserve benefits, you have access to the resources of active duty Education Centers in addition to the services provided by the 507th ARW Education and Training Flight. For instance, you are fully eligible to take classes offered on military installations by civilian colleges and universities.

Even if you can't attend traditional college classes, there are "external degree programs" offered by many

accredited institutions, which require you to take few, if any courses actually on their campus. Instead, you can complete degree requirements through attending local colleges, taking credit-by-examination tests, completing independent study courses, and via various methods of distance learning formats. If you are eligible for the G.I. Bill, there are lots of courses taught through non-traditional means for which you can receive financial assistance.

Sherrard nominated to command Air Force Reserve; McIntosh to become assistant to JCS chairman

ROBINS AIR FORCE BASE, Ga. - Maj. Gen. James E. Sherrard III has been nominated as the next chief of Air Force Reserve, replacing Maj. Gen. Robert A. McIntosh who becomes the first Reserve Assistant to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Sherrard currently commands 22nd Air Force at Dobbins Air Reserve Base, Ga.

The Chief of Air Force Reserve serves on the Air Staff as principal adviser to the Air Force Chief of Staff on Reserve matters. The Pentagon post is a dual-hat assignment as commander of Air Force Reserve Command with headquarters at Robins AFB, Ga.

McIntosh remains in Washington, D.C., to be one of two full-time reserve component advisers to the JCS chairman. Army National Guard Maj. Gen. Michael W. Davidson will represent the Guard. The Fiscal Year 1998 National Defense Authorization Act established both positions, which are two-year tours that may be extended for an additional term.

Commenting on his new job, McIntosh said, "Among the duties of these positions is the challenge of helping the Joint Staff and the Commanders in Chief of the combatant commands improve the reserve component contributions to the joint war plans. The job includes facilitating policy changes concerning reserve component forces."

Secretary of Defense William S. Cohen announced Sherrard's nomination by the president April 28. The next day, JCS Chairman Gen. Henry

H. Shelton revealed his selections.

McIntosh assumes his new duties in June. Sherrard replaces him upon Senate confirmation.

In an e-mail note April 29 to Air Force Reserve Command senior leaders, wing commanders and headquarters staff members, McIntosh wrote, "Your jobs were never easy because of the high tempo, the rapid and aggressive expansion of our mission portfolio, the push for high standards...and the continued stresses on resources. Each of you handled your jobs with talent and dedication. You always kept your focus on readiness and the mission."

Both McIntosh and

Sherrard served as 22nd Air Force commander when they were nominated to command the Reserve. Sherrard began the job in January. McIntosh was 22nd Air Force commander from July 1993 to October 1994.

They also had tours as the Reserve vice commander at Robins, serving as chief executive officer of the command's unit program. Sherrard was at Robins from July 1993 to October 1994 and from January 1995 to January 1998, serving briefly as 22nd Air Force commander from October 1994 to January 1995. McIntosh ran the day-to-day operation of the unit program from December 1990 to June 1993.

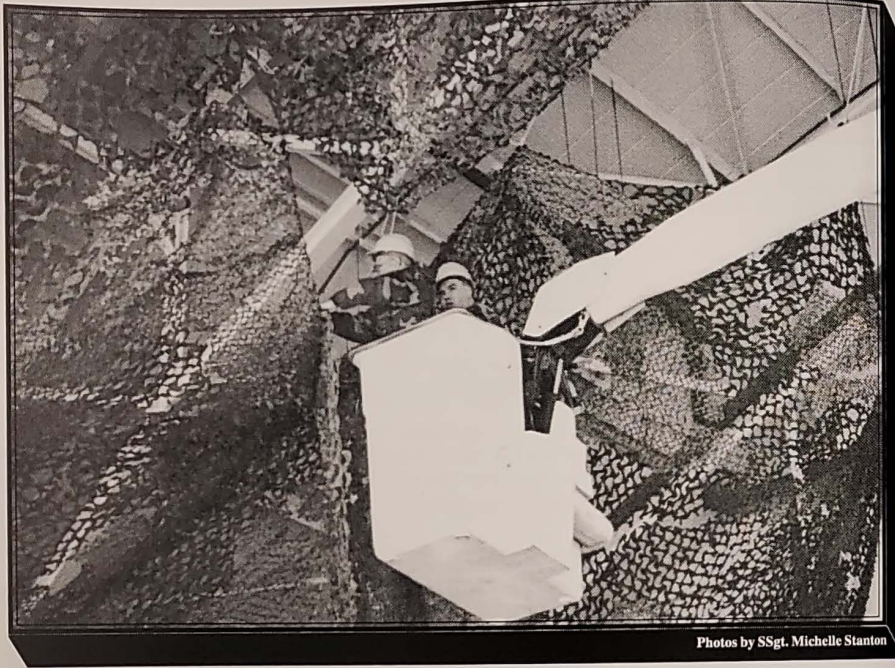
Their resumes also include tours as commander of the Reserve's two other numbered air forces. McIntosh commanded 10th Air Force, which was then primarily responsible for the Reserve's fighter and air refueling units, from July 1989 to November 1990. Sherrard had the helm of 4th Air Force, then primarily responsible for airlift units west of the Mississippi River, from February 1990 to July 1993. Their other assignments included command of flying wings, groups and squadrons. (AFRC News Service)

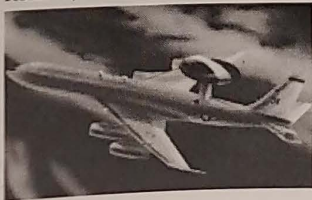

With so many unit members having access to computers, IM specialists' jobs have changed. Rarely, if ever, do they actually type a letter. Instead, they now provide guidance on the correct formats. WGA classes will make IM specialists more valuable to their units. Being more flexible and adaptable is the key to the changing IM field.

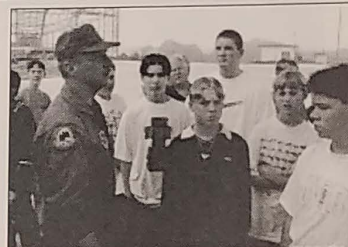

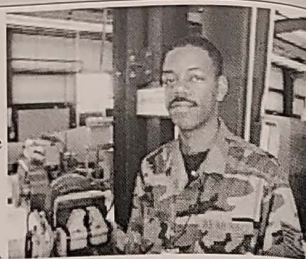

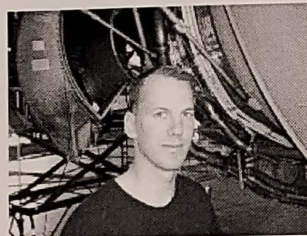

Air Force News Summaries

This summary is intended to give the reader a brief look at some Air Force Reserve events which occurred during the month.

Overseas recruiters seek candidates for Reserve

ROBINS AIR FORCE BASE, Ga. - To increase the success rate of recruiting prior-service Air Force people, Air Force Reserve Command has placed in-service recruiters in Europe and the Far East.

"More than 15,500 Reserve-eligible Air Force members will leave active duty in 1998, and more than 700 of them will complete their commitments at select overseas locations," said Maj. Dirk A. Palmer, chief of recruiting's operations branch at AFRC headquarters here. "By placing in-service recruiters at these locations, we can educate these individuals on opportunities in the Reserve as full or part-time citizen airmen."

Reservists manage European deployment

ROBINS AIR FORCE BASE, Ga. - Air Force Reserve Command airlifters from the East and West Coasts perfected their management skills of European strategic intra-theater deployments this spring.

For the third time in 16 months, reservists oversaw the flow of real-world missions from Ramstein Air Base, Germany. Three C-141 aircrews from the 446th Airlift Wing, McChord AFB, Wash., and one from the 514th Air Mobility Wing, McGuire AFB, N.J., flew channel missions April 9-May 15. Those missions included resupplying embassies, supporting theater commander-in-chief deployments, carrying household goods, delivering mail and airlifting "just about anything" needed in the region.

Reserve rescue helicopter picks up downed A-10 pilot

DAVIS-MONTHAN AIR FORCE BASE, Ariz. - Within 35 minutes of an Air Force A-10 crash May 14, an Air Force Reserve Command HH-60 rescue helicopter from here took off for the crash site.

The A-10 crashed at 3:25 p.m. MDT, three miles southwest of Kitt Peak, Ariz. Capt. Christopher Hamilton, a pilot at the Edwards AFB, Calif., test pilot school, ejected from the aircraft before the crash and suffered minor injuries.

The rescue team located the downed pilot about 100 yards from the crash site. Two crew members did a fast-rope rappel from the helicopter and hoisted the pilot aboard. The crew returned to Davis-Monthan AFB, where Hamilton was transported to the base hospital.

June 9, 1978: The 507th Tactical Fighter Group deployed 18 F-105s and more than 400 support personnel from Tinker AFB, Okla., to Royal Air Force Sculthorpe, United Kingdom. They returned to Tinker June 24.

June 1991: Reserve aircrews participated in Operation Fiery Vigil by assisting in the evacuation of those fleeing from the eruption of Mount Pinatubo near Clark Air Base in the Philippines. Reserve volunteers also provided assistance when McChord AFB, Wash., became a processing area and the largest group of personnel, nearly 13,000, arrived from the Philippines.
