


"Of course, we all know what a great asset the 507th is. Not only to our state, but to our nation," said Representative Kevin Calvey. "When my neighbors go TDY out around the world on various things we know just what a sacrifice you all have made to our state and our nation and we thank you from the bottom of our hearts and God bless you."

The Band of the United States Air Force Reserve is the oldest band, active or reserve, assigned to the Air Force, having continued from its formation in 1941 to the present without a break in service. The band was formed on October 1, 1941, at Mitchell Field, NY, as the First Air Force Band. During the first decade of its existence, the band was redesignated four times, first as the 8Ist Army Air Forces Band (August 1942), then as the 581st Army Band (December 1943), then as the 581st Air Force Band when the Air Force became a separate service in 1947. While at Mitchell Field the band was assigned to First Air Force (October 1941-March 1946); Headquarters, Continental Air Command (CAC). The 581st Air Force Band moved to Robins AFB, Ga., in April 1961 along with other units assigned directly to Headquarters, CAC. When Headquarters Air Force Reserve replaced the CAC on Aug. 1, 1968, the band assumed its present title as the Band of the United States Air Force Reserve. In 1996 the United States Air Force Reserve was made a major command in the Air Force.

The Band of the United States Air Force Reserve has always been one of the most productive bands in the Air Force. During the first decade and a half of its existence, it drew much of its membership from the rolls of the New York

musicians' union. During these early years the band was active throughout the Northeastern United States, performing in all the major cities at sites such as Radio City Music Hall and the Rockefeller Center. The band was also active in the broadcast media, having its own radio program during the 1940's called "Mitchell Field Men of the Air" which was heard on WOR and the Mutual Broadcast System. Recordings by the band were used as background music for "Voice of America" broadcasts in Europe, the Middle East, the Far East and Latin America.

Since moving to Robins AFB, the Band of the United States Air Force Reserve has continued to entertain heads of state. other political and military leaders, and countless American and foreign citizens, including the crews of the "Nautilus" atomic submarine and the Apollo 8, 9 and 10 moon flights. Among their key appearances at international events have been Hemisfair '68, the inaugural parade for the U.S. Virgin Islands first elected governor in 1971, the Detroit Interna-





tional Air Show, the change of command and retreat ceremonies in conjunction with the 1979 signing of the Panama Canal treaties, the 1982 World's Fair, the first foreign military unit to march through Red Square, Moscow, Russia in 1992, the only foreign military unit to perform in the 50th Celebration of VE Day Parade in St Petersburg, Russia in 1995 and most recently the band was the lead off unit in the internationally televised Rose Bowl Parade for the 50th Anniversary of the Air Force. The band marched in or participated in such regional events as the Indian and Texas Sequicentennial celebrations, the Aquatennial Parade in Minneapolis, Minn; the Great Circus Parade in Milwaukee, Wis; the Brevard, Mobile, Clearwater, Hollywood and Jacksonville Jazz Festivals and the Mardi Gras Festivities in New Orleans, La.

The band's appearances at the Indianapolis 500, the Daytona 500, Orange Bowl and the many professional football and baseball games have been broadcast on cable and network television. Other television appearances by elements of the band include those programs such as "To Tell the Truth," "What's My Line?," "Good Morning America," "The Today Show," "Captain Kangaroo," and "Nashville Now". During their live and televised performances over the past three decades, the band has appeared with such personalities as Bob Hope, Raymond Burr, Dinah Shore, Mary Ann Mobley and Maureen O'Hara Blair, Gary Morris, B.J. Thomas, the Lettermen, Mila Mason, and Lari White.

The Band of the United States Air Force Reserve today consists of 60 active duty musicians assigned to several subunits. The nucleus of this versatile organization is the highly acclaimed Concert Band which performs musical fare ranging from original band compositions and orchestral transcriptions to patriotic selections and marches, popular Broadway and show tunes. Smaller specialized performing groups formed from the concert band personnel include the Air Force Reserve Jazz Ensemble, Dixie Express, the Air Force Reserve Pipe Band, the Ceremonial Band, Brass and Woodwind Quintets, Tuba Euphonium Ensemble, High Flight, the Reserve Singers and solo performers. "Reserve Generation" a nine mem-



ber popular music combo, functions independently of the Concert Band, and is a leader throughout the entire Air Force band career field in making aware the dangers of drugs and alcohol abuse around the country, through their "Just Say No" counter drug production. They have been sharing their drug-free message since 1990, earning them national recognition and the 1995 Department of Defense Anti-Drug Awareness Award. This group was also awarded the Air Force Public Affairs Major Hap Arnold Award for their support of the democratization of Azerbaijan in 1996.

# Military Personnel Flight News

This month is the first month's edition of the Military Personnel Flight (MPF). Information contained here is designed to address as many concerns each month as possible. This month's edition addresses personnel wearing badges on the BDU, Service, Mess, Formal, and Semi-Formal Dress Uniforms.

One of the great things about the Air Force Reserve is the mixture of individuals we have from our sister services. Several of you have been in one of the other four branches at one time or the other and have earned various badges reflecting your service-that's great. Wearing those badges on AF uniforms has some restrictions. In accordance with AFI 36-2903, the following rules apply to the wearing of those badges.

—Obviously, if the Air Force issues the badge, it's optional with the exception of Chaplain and Aeronautical badges-in those cases, they're mandatory. You can wear more than one occupational badge, but your current career field's badge has to be in the top position.

—If you earned an aeronautical badge in another service, they're optional; however, the AF's aeronautical badge has to be on the top.

—Combat infantry or army medical badges can also be wom, but air assault, pathfinder, parachute riggers, and scuba badges can only be wom when you are performing those duties.

—Foreign badges can only be worn when attending official and social functions hosted by that government, but foreign aviation badges can only be worn with a US aviation badge.

—International and Air Force Shooter, rifle, and pistol badges earned during **competition** can be worn when awarded. These do not include military marksmen badges-they're not authorized.

—Badges of military societies may be worn as a member of the awarding society when attending those functions. Outstanding airman badges may also be worn for the year after the formal presentation.

—All other badges are not authorized for wear on any AF uniform.

### "Suicide is not necessarily painless"

Every year hundreds of people choose to end their lives with their own hands. Fortunately, there are those that have the awareness to detect behavior of others that may decide to commit suicide.

First Lt. Michael Salazar, logistic officer for the 507th Medical Squadron, was directly involved in the saving of someone's life Aug. 5.

While working for Parkside Psychiatric Services and Hospital in Tulsa, Okla., Salazar noted a patient attempting to jump off a balcony of an 8-story apartment complex. Salazar was able to wrestle with the individual and move him to safety. Had Salazar not been at the right place at the right time, another person in this world might have died needlessly.

This type of life-saving act could be accomplished by anyone having the knowledge to detect unusual behaviors in people. Fortunately, Salazar was aware and well trained in suicide prevention.

Salazar is a member of the 507th Medical Squadron as a Medical Service Officer (MSC). Through his bravery, he may have placed his own life in danger since the patient had an enormous physical build. His heroism is exemplified by his selfless actions.

In suicide prevention it is important to know the do's and don'ts. Some of these are:


- Be aware and learn the warning signs of a distressed person
- Ask if they are thinking about suicide
- Be direct and talk openly about their suicidal thoughts
- Listen
- Allow expression of feelings.

There are other considerations that professional counselors can provide, however even the lay person can be the most important intervention in a life-threatening situation.

Statistics show that one out of seven suicide attempts are successful. Most are men under 30 years old, Caucasian and either widowed or divorced. The methods used are hanging, poisoning, and jumping from high places, however the most prominent are self-inflicted gun shots.

Salazar was aware, and as a result a life was spared. Be alert to others that even jokingly talk about suicide.



#### TUITION ASSISTANCE FOR DISTANCE LEARNING

Reserve members are eligible to apply for Tuition Assistance (TA) for Distance Learning to further their education up to a Bachelor's Degree (members who have a Bachelor's Degree are eligible to pursue a second degree). The basic enrollment requirements are that, you must:

- Pay for the course up-front and after satisfactory completion, be reimbursed 75% (tuition only) per course, not to exceed \$1500 per FY.
- Enroll in only 1 course at a time, using the institutions listed in one of the three DANTES catalogs.
  - Be a participating member in good standing (no UIF, Article 15, etc.).
  - Complete enrollment form and have unit commander's approval.

#### **FREE COLLEGE TESTING**

Air Force Reserve members, spouses and civilian employees may take DANTES Subject Standardized Tests (DSSTs) or the College-Level Examinations Program (CLEP) tests FREE! The DSST and CLEP programs consist of a series of examinations that test college-level knowledge you may have gained through your job, reading, travel, or hobbies. Combined, the programs offer you more than 85 ways to get college credit. You must test at your Reserve DANTES approved test center. Testing at another DANTES test center will be on a case-by-case basis. The third Tuesday of each month at 0800 has been set aside for testing. You must call us four weeks prior to test date to ensure we will have your test by test date. Some tests are stocked while others must be ordered. For more information contact SMSgt. Epps in the MPF Education & Training Office at 734-7075.

#### TINKER AFB Airman Leadership School (ALS)

Reservists have now been provided the opportunity to attend the Tinker AFB Airman Leadership School (ALS). The purpose of the school is to (1) Prepare SrA to become effective supervisors (2) Modify SrA's values to appreciate the Profession of Arms (3) Develop SrA's knowledge of Leadership, Followership, Communication, and Profession of Arms. The course length is 24 academic days/189 hours. Students will be awarded 8 semester hours through CCAF upon completion of ALS. You must have 48 months time in service. This course requires a great deal of commitment on the part of individuals selected - time away from job and study. Interested individuals should contact their unit training manager or MSgt. Cain in wing training.

#### Reserve gets \$64.4 million for military construction

WASHINGTON - Air Force Reserve Command receives \$64.4 million to include funding for 11 major construction projects as part of the \$8.4 billion fiscal year 2000 Military Construction Appropriations Act.

Signed into law by the president Aug. 17, the act took effeet for the fiscal year starting Oct. 1, 1999.

Under the president's budget for FY 2000, which was announced Feb. 1, the Reserve was to get \$12.2 million to pay for part of five major construction projects with another \$16.4 million to follow in FY 2001 to complete those projects.

The rest of the \$64.4 million was to follow in later years to pay for other projects, but Congress decided to move up the timetable. By comparison, funding for AFRC "milcon" projects in FY 1999 totaled \$34.4 million.

#### Raising flying training age limit to help Reserve program

ROBINS AIR FORCE BASE, Ga. - On July 1, Air Force Chief of Staff, Gen. Michael E. Ryan, raised the age limit for applicants for undergraduate pilot and navigator training from  $27 \frac{1}{2}$  to 30.

Air Force Reserve Command officials here think the change - the first of its kind in 45 years - should strengthen what is already a very healthy Reserve undergraduate flying training program.

The age limit, which had been set at 27 years or 27 1/2 years since 1953, is being raised to broaden the pool of qualified applicants, Ryan said, emphasizing that the change is not due to a shortage of qualified applicants.

"The age limit is being raised to provide maximum opportunity for otherwise qualified candidates," Ryan said. "It will increase the pool of highly motivated applicants who. for various reasons, started their Air Force careers slightly later in life, and allow the Air Force to pick the best of that group. We have incorporated multiple contributing factors to arrive at an age which provides the maximum opportunity for outstanding candidates while ensuring that Air Force medical, safety, rated management and warfighting standards are met."

## Goico assumes vice commander's position

#### Authorization bill increases benefits, full-time manning

WASHINGTON – Better pay and benefits, and more full-time people are among key features of Air Force Reserve Command's portion of the fiscal year 2000 National Defense Authorization Act.

Signed into law Oct. 5 by the president, the act grants a 4.8 percent military pay raise, effective Jan. 1, 2000, the largest pay increase since a 14.3 percent hike in 1981. Additional raises take effect July 1 with a pay table reform, which primarily targets mid-level officers and NCOs.

To help keep pace with inflation, basic pay increases for FY2001 through FY2006 will be calculated using the annual Employment Cost Index plus .5 percent. This action will reduce the current 13.5 percent gap between military and private industry pay.

Manning: The new bill permits 1,134 Air Force reservists to serve full time as members of the Active Guard and Reserve, 142 more than in FY 1999, and calls for 9,785 full-time air reserve technicians, 24 more than in FY 1999. Part of the reason why Congress authorized the increase in the number of AGRs is to permit the Reserve to assume some missions performed by active-duty pilots in Air Force Materiel Command.

- The authorized end strength for traditional reservists, however, decreases for the first time in three years, from 74,243 in FY 1999 to 73,708 in FY 2000.

Retention and recruitment: Enlisted flight crew members who hold certain aviation specialty codes get a pay boost if they qualify for career enlisted flyer incentive pay. The new incentive replaces hazardous duty incentive pay for these people Oct. 1. CEFIP rates are based on years of aviation service. Pay for crew members ranges from \$150 a month for four or less years of service up to \$400 a month for more than 14 years. By comparison, hazardous duty incentive pay rates start at \$150 a month for E-1s to E-3s and go to \$240 for E-7 to E-9s. To qualify for continuous pay, flyers must meet gates of aviation service. They must be current and qualified for six of their first 10 years of flying, nine of 15 years for their second gate and 14 of 20 years for their third gate. Those entitled to less under the new system will get "Save Pay." They will continue to receive their current amount until they reach the next increment in years. Qualifying reservists get 1/30th of the monthly pay for each regular period of instruction or duty or for other equivalent training, instruction or duties as the secretary of the Air Force may prescribe. More than 3,000 enlisted Air Force reservists are in career flyer specialties.

- The FY 2000 bill extended the Reserve's authority through Dec. 31, 2000, to offer enlistment and reenlistment bonuses, and special pay to recruit and retain certain needed specialties.
- Starting Oct. 1, the maximum enlistment bonus for people entering the Selected Reserve climbs from \$5,000 to \$8,000 and no longer requires a minimum period of enlistment for priorservice people. The period a non-prior service person may be

extended in the delayed entry program increases from 180 to 365 days.

Other benefits: For the first time, members of the active force and the Ready Reserve will be able to participate in the Thrift Saving Plan, which has been available to federal civil service employees. The effective date is contingent on the president proposing offsets for the lost revenues in the FY 2001 budget request. Under the TSP program, military people can contribute up to 5 percent of their basic pay or reserve pay before taxes each month. They can also contribute special and incentive pays. The annual contribution limit is \$10,000. Although the federal government is not required to match servicemember contributions, the secretary of defense has the option of offering matching contributions to military members in critically manned skills in exchange for a commitment to serve for six years.

- Federal employees can now use military leave to perform inactive duty for training, such as unit training assemblies. In the past, they could only use military leave for annual tours and other non-IDT tours of duty.
- Reservists called to active duty for less than one year may not have to pay the deductible before TRICARE begins sharing the costs of medical care for them and their families. A provision of the defense bill allows the secretary of defense to waive the TRICARE deductible for members of the Reserve and National Guard who are called up for less than a year.
- The FY 2000 bill expands eligibility for voluntary enrollment dental plans to certain members of the Ready Reserve. Reservists subject to involuntary recall would share premium costs with the government, and the remaining members of the Individual Ready Reserve would pay the full premium cost.
- A provision of the bill authorizes giving reservists lodging in kind for IDTs when transient government housing is not available. This option especially benefits individual mobilization augmentees and unit reservists when they travel to major metropolitan locations, where on-base lodging is difficult to obtain.
- Another provision establishes a new type of duty for reservists to perform military funeral honors. Reservists earn retirement point credit and receive a \$50 stipend if the duty lasts at least two hours, plus they get travel entitlements if commuting more than 50 miles to perform this duty. They are also authorized medical care for injury or illness associated with this duty.
- Next of kin may now request military funeral honors for deceased members or former members of the Selected Reserve.

**Retirements:** Reservists will now be eligible to receive a flag, at no cost to the recipient, upon retiring.

- Reservists with more than 15 but less than 20 years of service who have a physical disability that did not occur in the line




Five members from the 1st Aviation Standards Flight (ASF) took part in the Federal Aviation Administration's airways check in the Alaskan region Sep. 7-18.

This particular mission required all military members involved to be outfitted in civilian attire while performing their duties at the civilian fields.


The BAe-800 "Hawker" aircraft is crammed packed with electronic testing equipment inside rendering just enough room for technicians to work.

The following question was asked of members of the 507th Air Refueling Wing and 513th Air Control Group: "Who have you persuaded to enlist into military service?"





"We persuade active duty guys to come over (to the Air Force Reserve) everyday. We hand out brochures and talk to those leaving active about joining us."









of duty may now qualify for a disability retirement.

Promotion potential: Under a provision of the defense bill, the chief of Air Force Reserve, other chiefs of reserve components and the directors of the Army National Guard and the Air National Guard may get to wear a third star if certain conditions are met.

First, the service secretary must recommend them for the promotion, which counts against the limit on the number of authorized three- and four-star general and flag officers. Second, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff must say they possess significant joint-duty experience. Reserve officers can gain joint experience as a result of repetitive tours of less than 180 days, as an individual mobilization augmentee, as an adviser to the JCS chairman or through some other experience. The secretary of defense can waive the joint-duty experience criteria until Oct. 1, 2002.

- However, not everyone in the service wants to get promoted. A provision of the authorization bill closes a loophole that allowed some Reserve officers to request not to be selected by a promotion board and, as a result, avoid a service obligation and having to repay bonuses.
