How to retire early from Reserve (really!)

507th Air Refueling Wing Public Affairs Reservists play an important role in the defense of our country. And many of us serve as long as our active duty counterparts, often taking deployments that not only keep us from our families and homes, but also our civilian jobs.

With the passage of a 2008 law, those deployments and other periods on active duty can bring reserve retirement a bit earlier.

The 2008 National Defense Authorization Act amended Title 10, USC Section 12731, a law dealing with military retirement eligibility age.

Basically, it means that starting on Jan. 29, 2008, 90 total days that a reservist spends on active duty in a fiscal year reduces that reservist's reserve retirement day by 90 days.

Although any reservist, regardless of rank or military branch, may apply active duty time to an early retirement, there are restrictions on what types of service apply. For example, involuntary mobilization, voluntary active duty, RPA, MPA and calls to active service in times of war or national emergency are examples of qualifying service.

But annual tour, captive status and active guard reserve (AGR) service are a few types of service that do not qualify.

And with early retirement, the usual benefits (commissary, exchange and services) will apply, but medical benefits are deferred until age 60.

Master Sgt. Christine Reed, the noncommissioned officer in charge of unit administration for the 507th Air Refueling Wing, recently took advantage of this law. She mailed copies of orders that reflected her active duty service since January 29, 2008, to the Air Reserve Personnel Center.

Reed said she had lots of copies of her active duty orders to send to ARPC to verify her active duty service. However, she said, the effort was well worth it, because she later received an email from ARPC that said that her retirement had been reduced by a whopping 15 months!

So how does she feel about retiring in August 2012?

In a word, "thrilled!"

"I've got a long list of things to do," said Reed, naming travel, reading, quilting and "being a grandma" as the important items on that list.

If you have active duty service you would like to apply to roll back your reserve retirement date, mail signed copies of all your certified active-duty orders to the following address:

Once the review is complete, you will be notified of the earliest date you can start to draw reserve retired pay.

Commentary: suicide prevention about being involved, not intrusive

GRAND FORKS AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- Today more than ever, we hear about the increasing suicide rate in the military. Our senior leaders are trying to figure out how to address this epidemic across the Air Force.

I say, at the most basic level, it comes down to leadership, and leadership is about relationships. In this environment of doing more with less, I believe we've lost some of the luxury of getting out from behind our emails and taskers and doing the important part - spending time with our Airmen.

But this is absolutely impera-

tive, because the truly lasting legacy every leader will leave is with the Airmen they lead, not with the unit or mission they belong to at the time.

For the most part, we have come to grips with drinking and driving. We won't hesitate to take car keys away from a fellow Airman, or offer to drive him or her home. We feel almost comfortable telling a wingman he or she has had too much to drink, because we know the results could negatively affect that person's Air Force career.

But the sad fact is we have Airmen dying, and not for the reason they joined, but because we feel it's "intrusive" to delve into their personal lives.

Being involved starts with feedback, both formal and informal, and includes opening up the lines of communication for that feedback to flow both ways.

It means getting to know the Airman, his family, the reason he joined the Air Force, his goals and dreams, and so forth.

It means making yourself available both on the field and off, and not letting yourself be distracted by emails and taskers.

It means having a relationship that allows for early detection of issues affecting that Airman's life.

And then it means acting

Father's memory honored on recent employer support flight

It had been 61 years since its last military flight.

And Cecilia Ainsworth figured 61 years was long enough for her father's pilot logbook to be grounded.

On December 3, Ainsworth, a production management specialist with Tinker's 421st Supply Chain Management Squadron, brought her father's pilot flight logbook with her during an employer support orientation flight held by the 507th Air Refueling Wing.

Employer support flights are routinely conducted by the 507th to provide reservists' employers the chance to witness the wing's air refueling mission and develop a greater appreciation and understanding of how important their support of the Air Force Reserve is to national defense.

Ainsworth said her father. Hulan Lee France, died in 2004, but "would have been thrilled to learn I was getting the opportunity to fly on a KC-135R Stratotanker and watch an aerial refueling mission." She said she decided to "bring the memory of my father with me" during the flight.

Hulan France entered the Army Air Corps in June 1940, receiving training at Ft. Sill, Okla., Jefferson, Mo. and in Florida.

He served overseas in 1943 in the China, India & Burma Theater and was honorably discharged from the Army Air Corps in September of



1945, receiving the American Defense Service Medal, the China-Burma-India Theater (C.B.I.) Ribbon with two battle stars and a Good Conduct Medal.

After a brief transition, France went back to the Army Air Forces to attend Officer Candidate School. His graduation ceremony was at Indoctrination Division Air Training Command in San Antonio, Texas, on June 28, 1947.

His pilot logbook's first entry date was on March 15, 1948, during an undergraduate pilot training mission flying an AT-6D at Randolph Air Force Base, Texas.

The logbook totaled roughly 375 flight hours of entries for a variety of aircraft missions, including the T-6, TB-25S, TB-25J, C-45, C-47 and C-54 aircraft.

But this flight would hold one last surprise for Ainsworth. "When we fly employers my

wing places each person's name in a hat to select two people to ride in the cockpit during the takeoff and landings," said Maj. Bill Pierce, the wing public affairs officer.

The luck of the draw favored Ainsworth, who sat in the boom operator's seat during takeoff.

After the mission, Col. Michael F. Mahon, 507 ARW vice commander and pilot for the mission, had the honor of updating her father's flight logbook with two additional hours aboard a KC-135R Stratotanker (see above photo).

For Ainsworth, the experience will be a memory to treasure. In an email to public affairs staff she said, "Thank you so much for Friday's flight. I thoroughly enjoyed every minute. This will be something I'll remember always! My father would be so thrilled!" **O-f**

supper tickets totaled \$23,889 this year.

"It gets better every year," said Glass of the annual steak supper fund raiser. "It's the most fun party you can go to that is still in a military setting."

2010 was also the second year for the 137th Air Refueling Wing, an associate wing from the Oklahoma Air National Guard, to participate in Operation Holiday Spirit.

Glass said the 137th taking part "helps teamwork between the two wings even more."

Ultimately, OHS benefitted 27 families in the 507 ARW, 137 ARW and 513 ACG.

"This is the best program at any military unit I've ever been in," said Glass.

Meanwhile, 507 ARW and 513 ARW reservists took part in the Angel Tree project for the tenth consecutive year.

The Norman, Okla., division of the Oklahoma Veterans Center is home to nearly 300 military retirees from



all branches of service, and participants in its Angel Tree project give gifts directly to those retirees each December.

Glen Williams, a recreational therapist and the activities director for the Norman veterans' home, said the Angel Tree project has been going for more than 20 years, and that it seems to get bigger every year.

Williams said that although more groups and organizations, like Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion, are giving gifts to the Norman veterans, "the last few years, it's been (the) 507th all the time."

Only the 507th and 513th give a gift to every veteran, said Williams, and "60 to 65 percent" of all gifts given come from the 507th and 513th.

This year, members and associates of the wing purchased gifts for 286 residents of the veterans' home, and several wing members personally gave gifts to those veterans.

Master Sgt. Christine Reed, the noncommissioned officer in charge of unit administration for the wing and an Angel Tree participant for the past ten years, said there has been "lots more activity" this year than in years past.

Reed said that once the announcement for Angel Tree went out to the wing, "right off the bat" more than 25 groups and individuals selected multiple veterans' names.

Reed also said that although the last veteran's name had been selected just after Thanksgiving, there were still "inquiries for (veterans') names a week later."

Glass said that he usually purchases the last few gifts left over for the Angel Tree project, but said that when he went to sign up for the gifts, "there was nothing left at the end."

Glass said that taking part in the Angel Tree project is "humbling," adding that the wing members "are their families."

"This is a chance for us to make Christmas happen for them." **O-f**

In case you haven't heard, the 507th Air Refueling Wing's Operational Readiness Inspection date has been changed from March 2012 to June 2012. Both Air Mobility Command and Fourth Air Force communicated the change:

"...Due to the realignment of AEF under the new B-band structure, both the 137th and 507th ARWs moved to a new band, thus making a March 2012

ORI impossible to conduct...507 ARW ORI has been rescheduled for 9-16 Jun 12 with the 161 ARW.."

What does this mean for our planning? Although we'd been working with the 164th Airlift Wing of the Tennessee Air National Guard, it means we'll now work with the 161st Air Refueling Wing out of Phoenix, Ariz.

Additionally, the 161st plans to participate in the Operational Readiness Training Program with readiness safeguard cadre from Volk Field, Wisc. 507 ARW and 137 ARW senior planners are scheduled

to meet their 161st counterparts in Phoenix. Their ORTP dates vary a little from what we had planned; regardless, we'll work together to either adjust our dates or theirs.

In the meantime, update your calendars for these new confirmed ORI dates and pass the information along to vour people.

Our ORTP is scheduled for February 8-13, 2011, at Will Rogers Air National Guard Base.

ORTP attendees need to know the following information:

ORI/ORTP PREPARATION

- Hours are approximately 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. each day.

- Tinker personnel will drive their POVs to the site.

- Hot lunch will be provided daily.

- Absolutely no personal cell phones are allowed.

- Tobacco use will be permitted only in designated areas.

- A command post phone number will be provided for all participants in case of emergency.

- The Exercise Evaluation Team, as well as readiness safeguard cadre and members of the 164th and 137th, will be on site to assist and observe.

Those selected for ORTP 1 and/or ORTP 2 training will need to bring/have the following:

- Airman's Manual (AFMAN 10-100)

- Reflective belt

- Web belt and canteen with water

- Military ID (a display armband will be issued at a later date)

- All Air Force-mandated computer-based training complete

- Mobility training gear, including the M-50 protective mask (shown in an image just below the end of this story).

ORTP selectees will be scheduled for and attend fitting, issue and training appointments for the M-50 protective mask. They should contact their respective unit schedulers or UDMs to make appointments.

While there are 100 new M-50 masks here on base in central storage, and all 507th members must accomplish a new mask fit test, ORTP 1, 2 and 3 participants will receive them first. Those who have spectacle inserts will need to bring a prescription (not older than one year) to the base hospital for new inserts to be ordered.

Finally, remember that we are all guests at WRANGB, and need to put our best foot forward and be proud of our unit and what we bring to the fight.

Also, talk to your employers and your families and know we are thankful for their support. We will need it as we continue to ramp up for our 2012 ORI. Hopefully not much else will change; however, change is, after all, constant.
