What's your role?

The Air Force Reserves has been around for 68 years and the one constant is change. I did some research on the Air Force Reserves and found some interesting information about how the role of the Reserves has changed. In the 1950s the Reserves' first big test was providing support during the Korean War. The 147,000 individuals mobilized during that period performed so well that legislation was passed into law that made some much needed changes to define Ready Reserve, Standby Reserve and Retired Reserve categories. Also, the legislation established the Air Reserve Technician (ART) program. The most significant portion of the law gave the President the ability to mobilize part of the Ready Reserve without getting Congressional approval.

Each decade the Reserves continued to assist in very important world events, such as the Berlin Crisis, Cuban Missile Crisis, and the Vietnam War. The Reserves has played a critical role in each major military event since its inception. Over the last 68 years the role of the Reserves has changed from an on-call force to continued daily support of military operations. In fact, without the support from the Reserves many of these important missions would not be accom-

plished.

In 1996, the 513th was the first and only AWACS Reserve Component unit so there were many discussions about what role the group would have with the active duty AWACS units. It wasn't long before the group found the best way to support the active duty with

maintenance personnel and operational assistance. The Air Force Reserve Command, as well as the 513th, changed dramatically after the 9/11 two year activation with the development of the AWACS Reserves support role. After the 9/11 activation the 513th continued to provide the active duty with year round assistance with operations and maintenance support.

When I joined the unit in 2002, I assumed I would be here a couple of years and then move on. I quickly learned that it was more of a family than just a part-time job. I have been part of the group 12 years this December, and it is hard to believe that time has passed so quickly. My relationships with oth-

er group members has developed over the years which will continue past my reserve career. I first realized the 513th was different when the Commander thanked everyone for giving up their weekend to attend drill. I realized that I wasn't just a number. On active duty you might have a couple of friends but most were just acquaintances but that isn't the case here.

Over the last 20 years, the group has matured and those that joined the unit in 1996 are beginning to retire and move to another phase of their lives. There are still a few of the "original" folks around but most of them have moved on. So with that being said, there are many leadership opportunities for others to fill that could influence the direction of the unit for years to come. The great thing about the Reserves is that you can decide on your participation level. If you would like an additional challenge, then seek out those opportunities as they present themselves. Also, communicate with your supervisor what you might be interested in doing in the future. My guess is that the Reserves and the role of the 513th will continue to change in the years to come. Decide what your role will be in the group and know that the most important part is giving your 100% effort in that role. Thanks for taking time out of your busy lives to serve in the Reserves!
