Lost in the alphabet soup of the AFIS, otherwise known as the Air Force Inspection System? Most of you have heard terms like UEI, MICT, WIT and CCIP thrown around your shops. In just a few short weeks, those terms will become very commonplace with the arrival of Air Force Reserve Command's Inspection General Team and the kickoff of the 513th Air Control Group's second Unit Effectiveness Inspection on Nov. 30.

The inspection process differs from the old operational readiness and unit compliance inspections. The UEI isn't conducted at an off-base location. It's also not a snapshot, but rather a continuous evaluation.

The Air Force rolled out the new system in 2013. Its goal: create a daily, continuous internal inspec-

tion process that will shape an onsite capstone visit by major command inspectors every 24 months.

Each individual Commander's Inspection Program, or CCIP, focuses on two components: self-assessment and the formal inspection.

Self-assessment is conducted through the Management Internal Control Toolkit, or MICT. This includes continuously updated self-assessment communicators. Both Air Reserve Technicians and Traditional Reservists need to know these communicators (sometimes referred to as checklists) in order to maintain compliance. However, performance isn't necessarily graded on a blind pursuit of compliance perfection.

In addition to our own inspection staff, commanders designate Wing Inspection Team (WIT) members in their sections. These Airmen are considered subject matter experts and work with the

inspection staff to monitor compliance. Everyone should know their WIT members in their section.

Units are assessed on four Major Graded Areas (MGAs): Executing the Mission (primary mission, warfighter support); Managing Resources (manpower, equipment, facilities, funds); Leading People (communication, discipline, training development); Improving the Unit (strategic alignment, process operations, data-driven decisions).

The new inspection process will create a "culture of disciplined compliance in which every Airman does his/her job right the first time and when no one is looking," according to the new inspection processes' guiding regulation, AFI 90-201.

ORLANDO, Fla. -- During the 49th Air Mobility Command and Airlift/Tanker Association Symposium in Orlando, Oct. 26 through 29, Lt. Gen. Maryanne Miller, commander of the Air Force Reserve Command, Air Force Reserve, unveiled the painting "Earth, Blood and Fire," a painting that depicts the Modular Airborne Fire Fighting Systems mission of the Air Force Reserve's 731st Airlift Squadron, 302nd Airlift Wing, Peterson, Air Force Base, Colorado.

The painting, created by artist and boom operator Senior Master Sgt. Darby Perrin, 507th Air Refueling Wing, Tinker Air force Base, Oklahoma, is the latest edition in the Air Force art program 'Inspire with Heritage.' A program, designed to showcase the Air Force Reserve story, highlight the Air Force Reserve's strengths and build pride throughout the ranks.

"That airplane is your squadron's airplane. Those people in the painting are the people you stand in formation with, work with, and go to war with," said Jim Malachowski, AFRC Director of History and

Heritage. "By using historically accurate vignettes and examples of our Airmen as lessons and role models, we help build Esprit de Corps and a sense of belonging."

Shortly after the reveal, "Earth, Blood and Fire," the eighth painting in the 'Inspire with Heritage' series will be transported and displayed with the rest of the collection at the Pentagon. High-resolution lithographs will be distributed for display at the Air Force Reserve Command Headquarters, the Numbered Air Force Command Headquarters and the depicted wing and squadrons.
