

# Air battle managers provide joint command and control at exercise Gunslinger 22

he 513th Air Control Group provided joint command and control at exercise Gunslinger 22 June 1-24, 2022, in Salina, Kansas.

First of its kind, Gunslinger is a large joint military exercise conducted by the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve's 4th Marine Aircraft Wing, and the Kansas Air National Guard's 134th Air Control Squadron designed to increase aircraft control and training for potential real-world contingencies.

According to deputy commander of the 513th Air Control Group, Col. Alison Schorr, the 513th ACG seized the rare opportunity to work alongside Marine Force Reserve, or MARFORRES, the smallest of all the Reserve components, in the exercise.

"As one of many tactical command and control nodes in the larger Joint All-Domain C2 environment, E-3 Sentry AWACS operators must understand the C2 architecture of each service and how our operations can better support one another in a peer-to-peer, contested environment," said Schorr.

513th ACG Air battle managers, Maj. Levi Limas and 2nd Lt. Stephanie Pihl-Jacks, provided support to the Marines and Kansas ANG in the exercise as



the AWACS liaison officers to both the 970th and 960th Airborne Air Control Squadron.

"My role is to plan the mission for the AWACS," Limas said. "We weren't able to bring the whole Air Control Group here to the exercise, so I'm here to see what the exercise planners need so I can call back to Tinker Air Force Base to tell them what we are going to provide to the fight," said Limas.

Schorr said the joint exercise with more than 1,300 military personnel from more than 11 training centers across the country provided great understanding and knowledge for the 513th ACG.

"It's not often an E-3 Sentry AWACS airman has the opportunity to witness the joint fight up close, and it was a great experience for me, Maj Limas, and 2nd Lt. Pihl-Jacks," said Schorr. "As the USAF adopts agile combat employment, or ACE, as doctrine, the concept of lighter, more agile C2 nodes become a necessity. And who better to learn to combat agility from than Marines? Hooah!"

According to lead exercise planner, Lt. Cmdr. Constance Ramsburg, 4th Marine Aircraft Wing Aeromedical Safety Officer, military members performed a broad range of operations including fixed wing and helicopter operations along with aviation ground support.

"This exercise enables every participant to apply the skills they've sharpened during Gunslinger 22 in a large-scale, complex and dynamic scenario," said Ramsburg. "By integrating joint training objectives and leveraging each service's strengths, we enhance the lethality and survivability of our personnel while ensuring we remain ready, relevant and responsive in any operating environment."

Gunslinger concluded training June 24, 2022 with a combat search and rescue mission focusing on rescuing two pilots from a simulated combat environment.

"By sending our 513th operators to train alongside Marines in their Tactical Air Coordination Center, we gain a better understanding of how best to communicate and coordinate in an all-domain fight," Schorr said. "Hopefully, we can build upon this training and bolster our integration in future iterations of the exercise."

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### Air Force hosts service chiefs to discuss JADC2

Reemphasizing a critical joint partnership in all-domain warfare, Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. CQ Brown, Jr. met with his fellow service chiefs from the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Space Force June 24 to share advancements and discuss the way forward as the services work together to continue cultivating common ground on Joint All-Domain Command and Control.

The meeting focused on the Defense Department's progress and projections for JADC2 in order to identify opportunities for the services to align their developmental efforts and to identify the obstacles that may frustrate moving forward to achieve the objectives of JADC2 in support of the joint force.

The senior leaders shared their views on areas of common agreement as well as areas where divergence in individual service efforts is appropriate. In this discussion, each of the services identified several areas on which they must focus in order to realize the intent behind JADC2 – to create and maintain a persistent connection in order to share data across the joint force.

Additionally, after a year of baseline activities in support of the JADC2 Strategy and Implementation Plan, the chiefs discussed the need for a more developed Concept of Operations, or CONOPS, for a future joint fight against a peer competitor, which is currently fraught with challenges when forces become disconnected from global communications networks. The creation of a CONOPS for command and control of the joint force is an essential step forward in creating decision advantage.

"As the Air Force develops (Advanced Battle Management System) in our effort to achieve information and decision advantage by delivering relevant data, information and capabilities to warfighters at all echelons, we must work together with our sister services and the DoD to ensure we connect our sensors and platforms and share our data as part of a joint force," Brown said. "Meetings like the one we held today are important to ensure we continue to stay aligned when it comes to JADC2 – where we are collectively and where we are going."

Space is not only an all-domain warfare enabler, but also an increasingly active warfighting domain. In today's talks, Chief of Space Operations Gen. John W. "Jay" Raymond outlined the Space Force's his Guardians' most recent contributions to the JADC2 effort to sense, make sense and act in space and throughout the joint battlespace.

"Our ability to sense from the space domain, transport and make sense of data, and then get that data into the hands of our joint warfighting partners on land, in the air and at sea, is what the Space Force delivers to JADC2," Raymond said. "Space capabilities underpin modern warfare."

Emphasizing the importance of JADC2 in the Marine Corps' Stand-In Forces concept, Commandant of the Marine Corps Gen. David H. Berger added, "JADC2 means the ability to move data and information in support of the joint force. It means we will improve decision-making processes toward a faster, more effective kill chain and ensure our Marines can best support the joint force to win in all domains."

As Army Futures Command prepares for the third iteration of Project Convergence, their annual JADC2 experimentation and demonstration event, Army Chief of Staff Gen. James C. McConville expressed his thoughts on the way ahead for sensor-to-shooter technologies to his fellow service chiefs:

"In large-scale combat operations, overmatch belongs to the side with decision dominance. Project Convergence is helping us figure out how to connect the right lethal system, the right shooter, the right arrow to get the lethal effects that we need in seconds rather than minutes or in some cases even hours. Having the joint force, allies, and partners involved helps us see ourselves – helps us remember that we never fight alone. That's why we're developing JADC2 as a joint force, and I always add a "C" for CJADC2, because we don't just fight as a joint force, we fight alongside our allies and partners."

Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Mike M. Gilday also highlighted the importance of all the services being on the same page when it comes to all-domain battle management and command and control.

"Project Overmatch is the Navy's contribution to JADC2, so as we develop the networks, infrastructure, data architecture, tools and analytics to enable sustained maritime dominance, it's critical the Navy remains in sync with our joint teammates," Gilday said. "Opportunities like this – to sit in the same room and hash things out with my fellow service chiefs – are indispensable to the progress of such high-priority initiatives."

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### Safety Note





Fireworks are a great way to amplify the joy of celebrating. Whether you are at a public display conducted by professionals or lighting the fireworks yourself. If you decide to use the fireworks at home, follow the manufacture instructions and keep safety in mind. Every year thousands of people are treated in emergency rooms after firework-related incidents. Lighting fireworks can be done safely and still be enjoyable. First step is to ensure fireworks are legal in your area. Then follow basic safety rules:

- Read the cautionary labels and performance description before igniting
- Don't drink alcohol while lighting fireworks
- Do not point fireworks at another person
- A responsible adult should supervise activities
- Only light one device at a time
- Never relight malfunctioned fireworks

### SAFE WORK PRACTICES

Safe work practices (SWP) help control hazards and manage risk associated with nonroutine tasks. SWPs are developed from job hazard analysis, Job Safety Training Outlines (JSTOs), safety investigations, inspections, safety briefings, safety talks, etc. JSTOs rings a bell? JSTOs are used to implement safe work practices. As a worker you should be aware of hazards prior to starting work. This could be useful in you avoiding accidents.

### **Respirator Protection**

Millions of workers are required to wear respirators in various workplaces. Using the right respirator, wearing it properly, and performing required inspections can save your life. Respirators protect you against hazards from the environment, harmful dusts, fogs, smokes, mists, gases, vapors, infectious diseases, and sprays. These hazards may cause cancer, lung impairment, or death. Compliance with the OSHA Respiratory Protection Standard could avert hundreds of deaths and thousands of illnesses annually.



**COGNITIVE DISTRACTIONS** A cognitive distraction is **anything that takes your mind off of performing any given task.** Any thought, daydream or recollection that distracts you mentally could result in disaster. The

only way to eliminate a cognitive distraction is to **FOCUS** on the task at hand. This prevent errors that could lead to accidents.



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
