Commander's Commentary

50 DAYS, DEFAULT AGGRESSIVE

When I took over in 2020, I stated in my inaugural address we would face significant headwinds and turbulence. However, it is only because of the skill and commitment of your leadership team and your tenacity as Airmen that have kept us on course. In addition, the AFR has undergone some significant reforms over the past four years, and we continue to improve the lives of our Airmen.

Now, we are ramping up training and preparations to combat our pacing threat as we look forward. To be very clear, China isn't only a military threat. China is executing "unrestricted warfare." China is conducting information, financial and trade warfare, as well as entirely new forms of war.

There is no domain in which China is not executing offensive patterns. The threat we face is much more significant than just the defense of Taiwan. China threatens global security and sovereignty and threatens our way of life. Our job is to defend Americans and our national interests worldwide.

For the U.S. to counter China's hostility, we must prepare with aggressiveness. Therefore, our training will be challenging but realistic because it is the duty of leaders at every level to develop and implement authentic training. Consequently, we are developing coordinated plans that will push you to excel, learn and grow to be comfortable with being uncomfortable.



The Chief of the Air Force Reserve issued clear and specific orders from Wing Commanders down to every Airman. At the basic level, our tasks are fourfold:

1. AFSC proficiency.

2. Maintain medical readiness.

3. Complete and maintain BAR (Basic Airman Readiness).

4. Maintain a high level of physical fitness and be prepared for combat.

Everything we do must be at speed. I'm asking you to run fast and push yourself and your fellow Airmen. If you feel comfortable and are not sweating, push harder. We will enter our AFFORGEN "available" phase in April 2025. That's only 50 UTA days away. Every time you put on our nation's uniform, every day you are in status, we must execute smartly. We have 50 days. GET READY.

Tactics outreach program builds key relationships

The tactics outreach program is a combined effort of the 513th Operations Support Squadron/OSK Tactics and 970th Airborne Air Control Squadron Tactics offices generating joint training opportunities within the traditional 970th AACS sortie arc that provides smallscale unit-level training in preparation for large forces exercises and combat employment.

Here's a look at some of our recent events: In the fall of 2022, we traveled to Naval Air Station Joint Reserve

Base, Texas, to brief 10th Air Force on our initiative to place Battle Management Teams on Mobility Air Force assets. We also coordinated with the 457th Fighter Squadron to receive an in-depth tour and exhibit of their F-16 Block 30s. This was a great opportunity for our younger Air Battle Managers such as 2nd Lt. Eric Haley and Capt. Caleb Wanzer to gather valuable perspective from

the fighter community. Each member observed the full mission planning process, and hands on instruction in the cockpit. The 457th FS AFE shop gave a great briefing on survival equipment. Lessons were collected on both sides as the fighters received a detailed demo from our E-3 Primary AWACS Display Desktop trainer from Lt. Col. Curtis Andersen showcasing the controller's aspect and abilities from our system of record.

Previously, our ABMs had the opportunity to visit the 31st Air Defense Artillery Patriot Unit at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma. The Phased Array Tracking Radar to Intercept of Target (PATRIOT) SAM system protects ground forces and critical assets at all echelons from advanced aircraft, cruise missiles and tactical ballistic missiles. The purpose of this visit was to discuss joint training opportunities between AWACS and ADA assets based on comprehension of capabilities and Techniques Tactics and Procedures.

During our visit, Lt. Col. Andersen, 1st Lt. Kevin Raedy and 2nd Lt. Michael Lopez and I provided a software demonstration of our PAD and a Q&A session to key attendees and several solders within the 31st ADA Battalion about our capabilities and our recent expeditionary role in Southwest Asia. There, the 31st ADA led the 970th AACS personnel on a tour of their simulation room and gave a demonstration of the PATRI-OT weapons system scope while answering questions about coordinating with command and control during real-world employment.

In addition, there was detailed discussion about how



COs (Air Defense Artillery Fire Control Officer) about war time and exercise operations while touring their control station.

Lastly, the 970th AACS officers were able to view the radar, control station, Patriot Advanced Capability missile launchers and communications node in action. Overall, it was an informative experience and we hope to continue to build rapport with the 31st ADA with the intent of gaining interest from additional Army agencies within Ft. Sill in order to facilitate a greater understanding of joint operations between Patriot missile defense systems and C2.

Past visits have extended as far as Ft Riley, Kansas to review capabilities with AH-64 Apache helicopters, Fam flights and tours of the KC-46 Pegasus at McConnell AFB, Kansas, and Altus Air Force Base, Oklahoma, along with tours of the MC-12W assigned to the 137th Special Operations Wing, Will Rogers Air National Guard Base, Oklahoma. DAF releases Military Parental Leave Program policy

The Department of the Air Force announced the expansion of the Military Parental Leave Program for Airmen and Guardians via guidance memorandum, which mirrors the Department of Defense's Directive-type Memorandum 23-001 – "Expansion of the Military Parental Leave Program."

Effective Dec. 27, 2022, the updated policy authorizes birth parents 12 weeks of parental leave following a provider-recommended period of convalescent leave and non-birth parents 12 weeks of leave following the birth of their child. The policy also grants adoptive parents and eligible foster parents 12 weeks of parental leave.

Previously, birth parents received six weeks of parental leave following their convalescent leave, and nonbirth parents received 21 days.

The expansion is in accordance with the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2022. It also builds on the DoD's support of military families and service members by streamlining and enhancing the parental leave benefit for active and reserve component service members (on active duty for 12 months or more) who give birth, adopt a child or provide long-term foster care.

Members who were on maternity convalescent leave or caregiver leave on Dec. 27, 2022, before the new policy went into effect, will also receive the expanded benefit.

Both the birth and non-birth parents can take the leave administered in accordance with the policies and procedures outlined in the DAFGM. The expansion of the MPLP, which applies to all eligible service members as of Dec. 27, 2022, takes precedence over previous DoD issuances and service regulations.

EXAMPLE 1. A service member adopted a child on Dec. 27, 2022. This member is eligible to take up to 12 weeks of non-chargeable leave in accordance with DAF-GM2023-01 para 3.2.2.10.2.

EXAMPLE 2. A service member designated as the primary caregiver is granted 6 weeks of maternity convalescent leave following the birth of a child and uses only 3 of the 6 weeks as of Dec. 27, 2022. Since the member will have unused caregiver leave as of Dec. 27, 2022, they would be eligible to transition to the expanded parental leave policy and take up to 12 weeks of non-chargeable leave after convalescent leave ends in accordance with DAFGM2023-01 para 3.2.2.10.2.

EXAMPLE 3. An Airman adopted a child on Nov. 25, 2022, then started secondary caregiver leave on Dec. 15, 2022. Since the Airman took leave in a consecutive increment from Dec. 15, 2022, to Dec. 26, 2022 (12 days), the remaining caregiver leave days automatically converted to 72 days on Dec. 27, 22 (84 days – 12 =72 days) and can be taken in multiple increments of 7 days or more. The member must take the remaining 72 days by Nov. 24, 2023, or forfeit the leave.



EXAMPLE 4. A service member designated as a secondary caregiver uses 2 of the 3 weeks of caregiver leave as of Dec. 27, 2022. With the service member having unused caregiver leave as of Dec 27, 2022, they would be eligible to transition to the expanded parental leave policy and take up to 10 weeks of non-chargeable leave, as they previously took 2 weeks.

EXAMPLE 5. A service member designated as the primary caregiver uses 5 of the 6 weeks of caregiver leave as of Dec. 27, 2022. Since the service member has unused caregiver leave as of Dec. 27, 2022, they would be able to take 7 weeks of parental leave, for 5 weeks were previously taken.
