



SUMMER ENCAMPMENT DRAWS NEAR FOR 937th TROOP CARRIER GROUP MEMBERS

Nearly 700 members of the 937th Troop Carrier Group begin their 15-day summer encampment July 31.

Summer camp kicks off with commander's call to be held in the base theater. Military justice, courtesy and a safety briefing are in order at this meeting.

In-processing will begin at 1200 by the personnel section. Lunch will be served from 1100 to 1200.

All personnel should be processed in by 1400 at which time 937th members will assemble by squadrons on the East Ramp where a group retreat and parade will be held. Duty day closes at 1530.

Duty hours for the encampment have been announced as 0700 to 1600. Sunday schedules will be announced by squadron commanders.

A full slate of athletics has been planned for after duty hours and complete details will be available at the up and coming UTA.

The teams will be comprised of members of the 937th's various squadrons, and regular competitive games or matches will be scheduled.

Softball, golf, volleyball, horseshoes, ping pong, badmitton, bridge, gin rummy, checkers and bowling teams will be organized if enough names are turned into first sergeants.

Is it really worth it?



Arrangements for housing for airmen will be announced during July UTA and each individual needing housing should check with his first sergeant.





BROWN FIRST RESERVIST TO QUALIFY AS FIRST FLIGHT ENGINEER

SUMMER RECREATION SAFETY RULES MAY PRE-VENT A FATALITY CHECK BY YOUR NAME

"Summer Leisure" time is here, and with it comes ever increaing hazards and acci- t dents. It should be a time when personnel become increasingly aware of summer recreation safety practices.

Since primarily our efforts for summer relaxation and fun center around bodies of water, this is where we should concentrate our safety awareness. Here are a few safety pointers to keep in mind during summer vacation periods.

Learn and apply boating "traffic rules". The number of persons participating in boating activities increase yearly, and without a keen knowledge sense of good boatmanship, accidents will increase accordingly. Having life preservers, jackets, first aid kits and good "common sense" are the first rules of boating.

Water skiing is a sport that attracts non-experts participants. Exercise caution when in the area of other skiers. Insure that your water skier wears a safety belt.

Swimming activities probably account for more accidents than any other water sport. Don't take chances. Know your physical limitations when swimming.

Scuba and skin diving require expert training. Poor physical conditioning of the participant, disobeying the rules, poor or faulty equipment and drinking are all contributors to fatalities in this sport.

These are just a few of the areas that one will probably come in contact with during the summer months. Safety rules are made to prevent accidents, but it is you who should apply them and see that they are enforced. Safety rules will prevent you from becoming a summer recreation fatility. COMMISSARY PRIVILEGES DURING SUMMER CAMP - Commissary privileges during summer encampment will be limited to military personnel who have a current reserve ID card and a set of orders for the active duty period. Wives will not be able to accompany husbands or shop alone. They must have a dependents ID card and these are only issued to personnel who are on active duty for more than 30 days.

FOR ALL OFFICERS - The 937 Trp Carr Gp Officers Fund is for the purpose of funding your ROA membership, two socials each year and remembrance to members and dependents. The fee is \$20.00 per year, payable either in the full amount or \$5.00 each calendar quarter. The 3rd quarter for calendar year 65 is due and payable. See Lt Col Carson, Maj Eden, Capt McCrory or Lt Shaffer and bring your account up to date.

GROUP SUMMER PARTY, 6 AUG 65 - The Group Summer Party is planned for Friday, 6 Aug 1965 at the Diamond Ball Room, 8000 S Eastern. Music will be by the CONAC band and a local band that normally plays at the club. Beer, set-ups and chips will be furnished. Tickets for the occasion will be mandatory to be admitted since this is a private club and they will be on sale by members of the NCO Council in each squadron. Members of the Group, whether or not they participate in the 2 week summer camp at this time are encouraged to participate in this occasion and a good time is in store, with the excellent music planned.

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NCO COUNCIL MEET - The Group NCO Council will meet Saturday 17 Jul 65 in the same location and time as the June meeting -Group Operations Command Post.

POLICY FOR CLASSROOM USE - The classrooms located in building 1030 including the Navigation and Operations Briefing Room will be scheduled on a first come first serve basis. Requests will include purpose for which classroom will be used a and submitted to the Ground Training Section or can be done by contacting Mr Royce Johnson at Extension 2935.

Request for classrooms for summer camp must be submitted in writing to the Ground Training Office during the July UTA.

DEADLINE FOR BULLETIN ITEMS - All items for the information bulletin (Sooner News) must be submitted to arrive in the Administrative Services Officenby the second Monday prior to each UTA.

All items for the 1965 Summer Camp Bulletin must be submitted to the Administrative Services Office by 19 July 1965.

GROUND TRAINING INFORMATION

Any airman below the grade of SSGT interested in performing a 12 day tour of active duty between 4-15 October 1965, contact the Ground Training Office during the July UTA and make application to perform driving duties for the National Security Seminar at Oklahoma City. You must have a valid state and Government driver's license, outstanding military appearance and thorough knowledge of the Oklahoma City area. All sections have become lax in submitting their requests for Specialty Knowledge Testing. All requests for testing will be submitted one UTA prior to the UTA month the airman is expected to take the test. No testing will be accomplished from this date (17 Jul 65) forward unless this standard procedure has been followed.

The Air Force Specialty Knowledge Test (AFSKT) will be administered in the following career fields during the July UTA. Airmen will be tested in Classroom 1 at 0800 hours, Sunday 18 Jul 65.

3 level: Any career field.

5 & 7 level: 22 23 30 32 34 40 53 55 57 58 65 67 68 70 72 74 75 77 & 92.

The AFSKT will be administered during August in the following career fields:

USAF Supv Exam, 33 36 42 43 61 63 64 90 & 98.

A special class is being conducted in Classroom 2 at 1400 hours on Saturday offeach'n UTA for all clerical (70XXX) personnel who do not have a 5-level AFSC awarded. Office supervisors will assure that their assigned clerical personnel attend this training.

The OJT Supervisor's Meeting will be held in Classroom 1 at 1330 hours, Saturday 17 Jul 65. All OJT Administrators and OJT Supervisors will attend this meeting. Trainers, NCOICs and OICs are encouraged to attend.

Commander's Call will be held in the Base Theater at 0800 hours, Saturday 17 Jul 65. All personnel will report to their assigned section at the base theater between 0730 - 0750 for signing of AF Form 40. Seating and signing of Form 40s will be the same as the previous Commander's Calls. All personnel who had birthdays in ell either April, May or June are required to take their test during the July UTA. The test will be given on the hangar floor as scheduled below:
