Off the drawing boards for months, the proposed official 937th TCG insignia is awaiting final approval by the unit insignia section of Headquarters USAF.

Drawn and conceived by Capt Jean Cotton, the insignia represents the culmination of the inner-workings of the 937th TCG.

The four-engine aircraft represents the global airlift command strattled by a cowboy to show the primary industry of the state of Oklahoma from which personnel are drawn -- the cattle industry.

Symbolizing the pioneer spirit of the founding fathers of Oklahoma is the covered wagon.

Background oil derricks represent the Oklahoma oil industry and the buildings in the skyline tie in with the close associative the near-by metropolitan areas.

Operating runways of the 937th are so wn by the light grey triangle in the ler portion of the insignia.

Colors incorporated in the insignia are blue, dark blue, white, red and yellow.








