TWENTY MEMBERS OF 937TH FLYING TEAM TO BE DECORATED DURING SATURDAY'S PARADE AND REVIEW

Twenty members of the 937th Troop Carrier croup will be decorated Saturday for flying duty in the Viet Nam Combat zone at the it's parade and review.

Set for 1000 hours, the parade's reviewing officer will be Col Stanley V. Rush, 512th Wing Commander.

937th personnel <u>will not</u> be permitted to drive cars to the parade grounds. Bus transportation will begin immediately after 0700 hours and the group will be formed in the street west of the parade grounds at 0930 hours.

"We want to emphasize that no personnel are to drive cars to the parade area," Lt Col Charles Von Stein says. "After the parade, the busses will return unit members to building 1030."

All personnel to be decorated will receive medals from Col Rush during the ceremonies.

Alcohol, as we all know, is a very use A liquid when used for its intended purpose. It is used in medicine and industry and, some forms, for protecting vechicles against freezing in winter.

When used in these ways, alcohol is of great benefit to mankind, but when taken into the bloodstream by drinking, can cause some very serious complications.

When a person takes alcohol in quantity and then starts to operate a motor vechicle it can, and usually does, lead to trouble. Your reflexes are effected to a much greater degree than most people realize.

One and one half ounces of whiskey, two glasses of beer, or one glass of wine causes some, but very little effect on reflexes.

Four and one half ounces of whiskey, three glasses of wine, or six beers markedly effect reaction timing and judgement.

Seven and one half ounces of whiskey, glasses of wine, or ten beers will denote definite uncoordination and obvious intor cation.

Most people have the "it couldn't happen to me" attitude, and this is not only a dangerous attitude but a foolish one. Accidents can happen to any one at any time.

Even when not drinking, driving is a hazard in itself. Add alcohol and you have the worst hazard on the road -- THE INTOXI-CATED DRIVER!!
