USAF TO INSPECT UNIT

A USAF Inspection team will visit the 937th Military Airlift Group during the week of March 30 - April 5 on what is called a management effectiveness inspection, Lt Col Charles Von Stein, group executive officer, said.

The team is on a world-wide tour checking both regular and reserve organizations. While at Tinker the group will inspect the 443rd Military Airlift Wing

"The team is checking reserve organizations which are pushing toward 100 percent manning before July 1," Von Stein says.

The inspection will not co-incide with the March or April UTA, but the visiting team will be here for about one week pouring over the records of the 937th, Von Stein explains.

IS YOUR CAR MAINTAINED PROPERLY?

TIRES. Look at your tires for unusual wear. If worn tires are discovered have tires balanced and front end alignment checked. Check tire pressure regularly and rotate tires at specified intervals.

WINDSHIELD. Check windshield wipers and washers. A clean windshield is mandatory for good driving.

BATTERY. A low battery is primarily the reason for cars failing to start. Check Battery at specified intervals for level of fluid.

BRAKES. A Brake with excessive travel or one that is very soft is a warning of probable problems. Check brakes out thoroughly prior to any long trip. Brake life can be increased if brakes are applied smoothly.

MUFFLER. The new mufflers and exhaust pipes furnished with todays automobiles are made of long life materials. This doesn't mean the system shouldn't be checked out for leaks due to corrosion or damage.

Today an automobile is designed to require only the minimum amoung of owner care. However, regular maintenance intervals is good insurance against major problems. The attention and care given your automobile will repay you by lasting longer and giving you better service.

ATTENTION DRAFT-DEFERRED OBLIGORS!

Recently an Air Force Reserve draft deferred obligor, who had been ordered to a 45-day active duty training tour for having failed to satisfactorily par ticipate in Reserve training, failed to report for this tour. He was immediately reported as AWOL and after 30 days was dropped from the rolls as a deserter. Approximately four months later he was apprehended by agents of the FBI and returned to his active duty training location. He was then tried by Special Court Martial and sentenced to be reduced to Airman Basic, confined at hard labor for two months, and ordered to forfeit \$50.00 per month for six months. During Calendar Year 1965 this headquarters approved action to report six draft-deferred individuals to the Selective Service System for priority induction (paragraph 41-6a(1), AFM 35-3. Of these six individuals, four were certified as noninductible and two were inducted into the Air Force. They are currently serving on active duty with the Regular Air Force.

These actions should serve to encourage unit commanders who may have previously considered that the "system defeated their efforts. There has been no change in policy governing reserve participation by draft-deferred obligors. Every request for invoked tour or induction must be properly documented so as to afford not only the individual his rights but also commanders as well.





The Air Force Specialty Knowledge
Test (AFSKT) will be administered in the

UTA. Airmen will be tested in Bldg Nr
200 at 0800 hours, Sunday, 13 Mar 1966.
Bldg 200 is located east of Parking Lot
No 2 which is just East of the flag pole
and Fire Station No 1.

3 Level: Any field.

5 and 7 level: 20, 24, 27, 29, 31, 46, 47, 54, 56, 60, 62, 73 and 82.

CDC Emd of Course Test will be admintered the same time and place as the SKT as scheduled above.

The AFSKT will be administered during the April UTA in the following career fields: 22, 23, 25, 30, 32, 34, 40, 53, 55, 57, 58, 59, 65, 67, 68, 70, 72, 74, 75, 77, and 92.

The OJT Supervisor's Meeting will be held in Classroom No 1 at 1330 hours, Saturday 12 March 1966. All OJT Administrators and OJT Supervisors will attend this meeting. Commanders, Trainers, NCOICs and OICs are encouraged to attend.

All personnel, other than aircrew members, whose birth date falls during the months of October, November or December, will take the Physical Fitness Test during the March UTA. The test will be given on the hangar floor (Bldg 1030) as scheduled below.
