# 12th Encampment 10-24 Aug

The 12th annual encampment for members of the 937th Military Airlift Group begins' at 0800 hours, August 10, with "in-processing" that will be held in the hangar parachute shop.

Members of the unit will check in at vrious times depending; upon which section one is assigned to and how far one has to travel to be here for the encampment. Each person's reporting time is shown on his orders.

Group Headquarters is scheduled to be the first section to go through the processing line at 0800, followed by APF and 305th at 0815, Dispensary and AME at 0830, Comm Flt at 0845, CAM squadron 0900, Supply at 1000 and Support at 1030.

Immunizations will be given during in-processing and I.D. cards as well as "dog tags" will be checked. Persons should make sure to bring shot records, I.D. cards and dog tags.

Commander's call for Gp Hq, Sp Sq, Disp, AME, Comm, 305th and APF is scheduled for the new base theater at 1300 hours. CAM Sq and Supply will have commander's call the following day.

Duty hours for the encampment have been set for 0730-1615 with a 45 minute period for lunch. Special events set for the 15-day encampment inlcude the annual Military Ball to be held at 8 p.m. in the Top of the Mall ballroom in Shepherd Mall. The ball will be held Aug. 16 and tickets are \$1.50 per person.

Aug. 17 has been designated "Family Day" for the 937th and it promises to be a repeat of last year's program when more than 3,000 turned out for the activities.

Family Day will kick off with a parade and review on the Tinker parade grounds at 1000. The parade will be followed by open house at building 1030 with static display of aircraft, a picnic lunch and entertainment plannned for the afternoon at the base picnic grounds.

The middle Sunday of the encampment, 18 Aug., has been designated a day off but then it's back to the regular duty hours on Monday. The encampment will close with pay and out processing 24 Aug.

MILITARY BALL, FAMILY DAY EVENTS TO HIGHLIGHT 12th ENCAMPMENT

Two of the traditional highlights of the annual encampment each August are the Military Ball and Family Day set for Aug 16 and 17.

These activities come at the midpoint of the encampment and provide the opportunity for a bit of family involvement in the program of the 937th.

The military ball is planned for the Top of the Mall ballroom in Shepherd Mall at 8 p:m., Aug 16. Charge for the event which includes set-ups is \$1.50 per person.

Music for the ball will be provided by the Continental Air Command Band which is also scheduled to perform at the annual parade and review the following day.

Tickets are on sale for both events and will be available to unit members during the August UTA and the early part of the annual encampment.

Door privzes, the largest and best selection ever gathered, will be given away at both the ball and family day. Ticket purchases are required for participation in the competition.

Some of the prizes include a portable TV set, fishing rod, dinner for two at several different eating spots, Hiabachi pots from Japan, theater tickets and gift certificates.

Two sections of the; unit were 100 percent in purchase of tickets during the July UTA. Supply and the 305th had reached 100 percent and the Aerial Port Flight attained 65 percent.

# CONTINENTAL AIR COMMAND CHANGES NAME TO HEADQUARTERS AIR FORCE RESERVE

Continental Air Command officially changed its name to Headquarters Air Force Reserve on August 1 but will continue to be headquartered at Rowins AFB, Ga.

While operating as a separate agency under the Air Force Chief of Staff, Hq AFRes will receive technical guidance from the recently activated Office of Air Force Reserve in Washington, D.C., commanded by Maj Gen Tom T. Marchbanks Jr.

In command of the new Air Reserve Headquarters at Robins will be Maj Gen (designee) Rollin B. Moore Jr., currently commander of the 349th Military Airlift WIng, Hamilton AFB, Calif. General Moore succeeds Lt Gen Henry Viccellio who retired 1 Aug.

Under the reorganization of the Air Force Reserve, plans call for the Res serves to be operationally and administratively managed by Reservists as a reserve command.

A Functional survey will be made to determine which of the present CAC activities will be better suited to the Pentagon and which will remain at Robins AFB.

In discussing the new structure, General Marchbanks said, "I think this is important if we are to enter the future as a distinct entity even though we realize our purpose in being is to become an integral part of the U.S. Air Force when needed and to serve Air Force needs as a part of our training while we are in Reserve staus."

Marchbanks said he is initiating a survey "to determine how we can effect the best possible management structure for the Air Force Reserve."

Marchbanks said the purpose of his study is "to make the combination of Headquarters Air Force Reserve and the Office of Air Force Reserve a perfect blending from which will come an Air Force Reserve fully responsive to all Air Force requirments."
