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Airmen Eligible for OTS

Air Force Reserve Personnel officials have issued a reminder that Reserve airmen are eligible to apply for Officer Training School. Those accepted and completing OTS return to their Reserve unit and serve as an officer.

Airmen interested in the program should apply under the guidelines of AFR 53-27. Basically, an applicant for non-rated duty must be between the ages of 20 1/2 and 29 1/2 and must be commissioned before reaching age 30. An applicant must also possess a baccalureate or higher degree from a college or university.

Airmen interested in this program should contact their unit personnel officer.

Program Plans Careers

DENVER (AFNS). A new program is underway at the Air Reserve Personnel Center (ARPC) here to assist Reserve officers in planning their military careers.

The first is to provide total resource management within the Total Force Policy. The second is to involve the Reserve officer in mapping out his career, and providing him with the tools to meet those career objectives.

Commander's Call

During the next 3 vears the Air Force will be participating in and supporting the new Federal "Safety '76" campaign which replaces the "Zero In" safety campaign of earlier years.

Many managers and supervisors see safety as the responsibility of their local safety staff offices, an unfortunate perception that is only partially correct While it is true that the safety staff provides technical advice and assistance to functional managers and supervisors. primary purpose of the safety staff is to manage the commander's safety program.

Accident prevention, however, is a functional responsibility and an accident must be considered evidence of super visory failure. There should be no doubt that the supervisor occupies the key position in the organizational structure in carrying out the commander's safety policy. It is the supervisors who are most immediately involved in preventing accidents and injuries among workers.

The conscientious supervisor is always aware of his duty to keep employees under his control from harm and injury. This important part of the supervisor's job will depend in large part on how accident prevention and safety programs are supported by managers and commanders at each level.

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
Schatz With Honors


Sublett was born in Edmond; his parents are Mr & Mrs John W Sublett, an attorney with Hall & Sublett law firm in Tulsa.
